Magistrate Raps Club Operations

Twenty-three cases came before Magistrate A. James Haslam in his police court Saturday morning.

Commenting on one case of possession of liquor not in residence, the magistrate said that, in the opinion of the court, a number of the infractions of the Liquor Control Act were due to the operation of various clubs within the city, where admission did not require the showing of a membership or signing of a register.

The largest fine for the docket—\$125 and costs or 30 days—was imposed on Bruce L. MacPherson, Cornwall, for driving while impaired. The accused, represented by Lester O'Donnell, has been charged with drunken driving, but his plea of guilty to the lesser charge was accepted by the court.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT
 On a charge of disorderly conduct, Norman Joseph Acosta, Kinross, was fined \$40 and costs or 30 days. Chas. Sterling Williams testified that the accused has been "roaring and shouting" on the corner of Grafton and Queen streets while church ceremony.

Volunteer Teenage Nurses Are Big Help To Hospital

Speaking of the Red Cross volunteers at the Princess Edward Island Hospital, Mrs. T.J. Ling said "They're a big help. Our only problem with them is to keep them from doing too much."

Mrs. Ling is in charge of the "Volunteers," a group of six 15-18 year old girls who volunteer up a lot of their vacation time this summer to do volunteer work at the hospital.

The six—Julie Foster, Dorothy Baxter, Karen Toombs, Judy Dillon, Paula Drescher, and Roberta Reid—are Charlottetown high school students who look a Teen Home Nursing and any necessary nursing.
