They Play Too Slow

I HAD a talk with L.V. "Paddy" Kavanagh, Montreal manager of the Royal Canadian Golf Association, at Bellevue yesterday afternoon during play in the Canadian Junior golf championships.

"The biggest problem that amateur golf has today is that they play too slow," Kavanagh said. "They have the pros on T.V. give such a concentration and then you want to go out and do the same thing.

"The slow player has hurt amateur golf in both Canada and the United States. It takes a lot of enjoyment out of the game to have a guy ahead of you take 10 minutes to study a putt; I saw a youngster do this today.

"It's OK if you're one of the pros. You can afford to take some time to see the shots, they study so often, they pay off in greenbacks. But for the amateurs it should be sport. We tell the kids to make sure they're careful about their shot. The extremists hurt the game."

Kavanagh said it should take three golfers on an average of three hours to play a Bellevue course. The maximum should be four hours but he said, and some of them can make it in three hours. "One of the fast golfers like Moe Norman or Dave Ford, you think this course is two and a half hours."

To keep things moving as fast as possible during Tuesday's rounds, a committee member said, all times to check the progress of players. If a group falls a complete hole behind the rest of the field they were warned, and if their play doesn't pick up they could be penalized two strokes in medal play or disqualified in match play.

May Increase Entries

KAVANAGH, who has worked in various aspects of the newspaper business and became a member of the Royal Canadian Golf Association five years ago said a recommendation to make the 1965 Canadian amateur golf championships be conducted in the same manner as the Junior Cup and Amateur play.

The four-day Junior tournament limits entries to 80 because the team championships (36 holes) are played on one day and the rest of the field is made up of the country's best 44 handicap golfers who will come at their own expense. The 22 with the best scores in the first day's competition go on to medal play for the individual championship.

Kavanagh said the Junior medal may be changed to 18 holes instead of 36 on the opening day so that more golfers (probably 120) would get a chance to qualify for the individual championship.

Financing may be the big problem facing the Royal Association however. This year, as in the past five years, the Pepsi-Cola Canada Ltd. has donated approximately \$7,000 into the Junior tournament. Any decision on doubling the number of competitors would require more coverage by Pepsi and the Association) would probably only be made if Pepsi is willing to go along with a considerable amount of the anticipated extra cost.

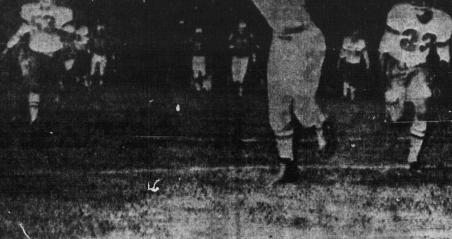
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Riders Down Toronto Argos
