

Alston Completes National League All Star Lineup

CINCINNATI (CP) — The National League all-star team was completed Tuesday when manager Walter Alston of Brooklyn Dodgers named seven pitchers, two catchers, four outfielders and four infielders to the roster.

They are in addition to the eight starting players, covering all positions except pitching, selected by a vote of the fans.

Earlier Tuesday the American League team took final shape when manager Casey Stengel of New York Yankees named eight pitchers and eight other players to augment the fans' choices.

Stengel also nominated two Washington players, pitcher Dean Stone and first baseman Mickey Vernon, to replace Ferris Fain and George Kell of Chicago, both of whom are injured.

The game will be played at Cleveland July 13. The American League has won 12 of the previous 20 games but the National League has taken the last four.

Alston named four right-handers and three southpaws to his pitching staff. The right-handers are Robin Roberts of Philadelphia, Carl Erskine of Brooklyn, Gene Conley of Milwaukee and Marvin Grissom of New York; the lefties, Warren Spahn of Milwaukee, Harvey Haddix of St. Louis and Johnny Antonelli of New York.

Picked as starters by the fans were Roy Campanella of Brooklyn, catcher; Ted Kluszewski, Cincinnati, first base; Granny Hamner, Philadelphia, second base; Alvin Dark, New York, shortstop; Ray Jablonski, St. Louis, third base; Jackie Robinson, Brooklyn, left field; Duke Snider, Brooklyn, center field; and Stan Musial, St. Louis, right field.

To back up the starters Alston chose catchers Smokey Burgess of Philadelphia and Dell Crandall of Milwaukee; infielders Gil Hodges and Peeewe Reese of Brooklyn.

Red Schoendienst of St. Louis, and Ramsay Jackson of Chicago, outfielders; Don Mueller and Willie Mays of New York, Gus Bell of Cincinnati and Frank Tomas of Pittsburgh.

Stengel has stacked his pitching staff with righthand pitching, apparently in an effort to combat the National League's righthand hitting power. Only Whitey Ford and Stone of the American Leaguers are southpaws.

But Alston's team will not be without potent lefthand hitting after the first three innings. By showing either Bell or Mueller into Robinson's spot and the switch-hitting Schoendienst into Hamner's, Alston would have five lefthand hitters and three righthanders, exclusive of the pitcher.

Stanky Denies Milwaukee Story

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Manager Eddie Stanky Tuesday branded as a false rumor a Milwaukee story saying anti-Stanky feeling has "grown amazingly in the last few weeks" and has spread to St. Louis Cardinals players.

The Milwaukee Sentinel, in a story by the byline of staff writer Lou Chapman, said "resentment against the little Napoleon has even hit the players' ranks, it is reported, with most of the Cardinals plainly dissatisfied with his methods."

The usually fiery Stanky seemed calm and collected when he was asked for comment on the story and obviously already had heard about it.

"We have men on this ball club," the Cardinal manager said. "My ball players are not in the habit of giving out stories without their names being used."

"Naturally, then, this is a false rumor and I do not comment on false rumors."

Chapman wrote that Stanky is unpopular with fans and players alike but apparently is in solid with owner August A. Busch and in no danger of being ousted.

Fain May Be Out For Season

DETROIT (AP)—Chicago White Sox, still reeling from a four-game trimming by first place Cleveland last week-end, learned Tuesday first baseman Ferris Fain may be out for the rest of the season.

Fain and third baseman George Kell are out because of injured right knees. Kell may be sidelined a month.

Fain's knee, injured a week ago Sunday, still is swollen an inch more than normal from a severely strained ligament. Kell has a torn knee cartilage from tripping over first base last Friday night.

German Car Wins French Race

RHEIMS, France. (Reuters) — German Mercedes cars making their first postwar reappearance in grand prix motor racing, finished first and second with one yard separating the machines in the French Grand Prix here Sunday.

Juan Manuel Fangio, the Argentine ace, just held off his teammate, Karl Kling of Germany.

Fangio's time for the 81 laps of the five-mile circuit was two hours, 42 minutes, 47.9 seconds at an average speed of about 116 miles an hour.

Robert Manzoni, of France, was third in a Ferrari. Only seven cars finished.

Soccer Team Gets Hero's Welcome

MUNICH, Germany (AP)—Germany's world champion soccer team received a hero's welcome from 500,000 fans Tuesday in the biggest ovation ever recorded in this ancient city's history.

Police officials said the turnout surpassed "by far" even the huge crowds of the Hitler era when Munich was the capital of the Nazi party.

The players had just returned from Bern, Switzerland, where on Sunday they upset Hungary 3-2 in the final of the world championship tournament.

DUBLIN (AP) — Maureen Connolly, the Wimbledon champion from San Diego, Calif., moved into the semi-finals of the Irish lawn tennis championship Wednesday with a 6-3, 6-3 victory over Miss E. F. Lombard of Ireland.

Mrs. Nell Hopman, wife of the Australian Davis Cup team captain, defeated Miss M. Meenan of Ireland 6-2, 6-3 in a second round match.

In the men's division, Hugh Stewart of Los Angeles and Mervyn Rose, the Australian champion, led the way into the third round by defeating Irish players. Stewart beat G. P. Jackson, Irish Davis Cupper, 7-5, 8-6 and Rose trounced V. Gotto 6-0, 6-3.

Lorne Main of Vancouver and Toronto won a second round match from Ireland's J. P. McHale 6-3, 6-4 and then was eliminated by Australia's Neil Fraser 7-5, 6-3.

Leading Golfers Use Old Putters

SOUTHPORT, England (AP) — Two battered putters, one of them a 45-year-old blade that sold for 28 cents and the other a short shaft kid's putter, carried two little-known British golfers into the lead Wednesday in the British open golf championship.

Sam King and Bill Spence shot record-equalling 69s in the first round on breezy Birkdale to tie for the lead with a one stroke margin over their closest rival.

Norman Sutton, another Briton, shot a 70, and a trio of '71s were posted by Antonio Cerda of Argentina and Britain's George Howard and J. R. M. Jacobs. Nearly a dozen others shot 72.

The 72 shooters included Jim Turnesa of Briarcliff, N.Y., low man among the Americans who are trying to pick up the title won last year by Ben Hogan.

Low amateur after Wednesday's round was little Peter Toogood of Kingston Beach, Tasmania, with a solid 72.
