

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.

Gentlemen who have just arrived from Manitoba state that the condition of the Pombina Branch has been very much improved, and is now giving general satisfaction.

It is reported that Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, before leaving for England, left instructions with the head carpenter at Rideau Hall to fall some trees in the grounds, and construct a regular backwoods shanty, including campboose, crane, and the usual cooking apparatus, bunks, etc. It is intended as a curiosity.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 1.

Baker Pasha started for his post as representative of the Sultan to superintend the introduction of reforms throughout the whole of Asia Minor.

BERLIN, Dec. 1.

Gortschakoff had an interview with the Emperor yesterday. He proceeded to Russia to-day. The Czar and Czare will meet at Moscow on Tuesday, where the nobility will be received and an address delivered.

CABUL, Dec. 1.

Under instructions from the Viceroy of India, ex-Ameer Yakob Khan left Cabul to-day for Peshawa under the charge of Capt. Turner and escort.

LONDON, Dec. 1.

The News' Berlin despatch says that Bismarck will probably arrive there on Thursday. It seems that negotiations between Bismarck and the Vatican have suddenly closed. Bismarck will not agree to the restoration of the German Bishops. There seems to be every possibility that the old struggles are recommencing.

PARIS, Dec. 1.

The Bureau of the Left have agreed upon the following points as the main part of their political programme:—Liberty of meeting and lawful association; liberty of the press and gratuitous secular compulsory education.

The Parliamentary situation appears less strained.

WHAT is known as the "Forty hours perpetual adoration of the Blessed Sacrament," will commence in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Saturday morning, and will continue on the following Sunday and Monday.

MR. ROBERT HARRIS, artist, left to-day for Toronto where he purposes spending the winter. We learn that a number of landscape paintings, in oil, done by him during the past summer will, in the course of a few weeks be sold at auction by Mr. Dodd.

SPEARING SALMON is now carried on to a great extent in the salmon streams of this Province. We hear of four poachers who speared thirteen salmon at Winter River a few days ago. The Inspector of Fisheries should lose no time in prosecuting such offenders. If the practice is not immediately stopped, the good work of re-stocking our rivers will be altogether vain.

A SLIGHT fire occurred to-day, in a tenement house, situated on Water street, opposite the Railway Freight House. It occurred by a spark falling from the chimney through a hole in the roof and igniting the contents of a bed tick. It was extinguished before any damage was done to the house. "Silsby" engine put in an appearance, but her services were not required.

SMALL MARKET to-day; prices as follows: Beef (small) from 5 to 12 cents per lb; beef (qr.) from 3 to 6 cents per lb.; mutton, from 4 to 8 cents per lb.; lamb, from 4 to 8 cents per lb.; pork (per lb.) from 7 to 9 cents; pork (per carcass) from 5 to 5½ cents; geese, from 40 to 55 cents each; ducks, from 20 to 28 cents each; chickens, from 30 to 45 cents per pair; butter (fresh) from 16 to 20 cents per lb.; butter (tab) from 15 to 16 cents per lb.; eggs, from 16 to 18 per doz; potatoes, from 16 to 20 cents per bushel; oats, from 33 to 34 cents per bushel; hay, from 35 to 36 cents per 100 lbs; flour per 100 lbs., from 3.00 to 3.25; oatmeal from 2.25 to 2.50.

PRODUCE SHIPMENTS.—The "Deodoras" sailed for Plymouth on Saturday with a cargo consisting of 3,020 bushels of oats and 208 pieces of deal, shipped by R. F. Quirk. The sch. "A. McLeod" cleared for Queenstown on Monday with a cargo 14,545 bushels of oats, 35,000 feet deals, 1,100 feet boards, shipped by A. McLeod, and the sch. "Mary Eleanor" cleared for Boston Monday with 4,800 bush. potatoes by S. H. Brown. The brig. Elba cleared for Queenstown, G. B., to-day, with a cargo consisting of 25,300 bushels oats and 10,000 feet deals, shipped by A. H. Yates. The barq. M. J. Foley also cleared for Queenstown to-day, with 32,970 bushels oats, 400 pieces deals, 30 boxes preserved mutton, and 20 boxes preserved geese, shipped by P. Foley. The brig Peeross cleared for Nantes, France, yesterday, with 19,994 bushels oats and 350 pieces deals, shipped by R. F. Quirk.
