IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JOHN A. MacKINNON

The death occurred suddenly at her home in Ottawa during the early hours of Wednesday, June 7th of Mrs. Annie Ellen MacKinnon, dearly beloved wife of John Angus MacKinnon.

About two months previous to her death, the late Mrs. MacKinnon had the misfortune to fall in her home sustaining a fractured hip. After several weeks spent in Ottawa Civic Hospital, she returned home and was apparently well on the road to recovery when she succumbed to a sudden heart attack on the above date and died before medical aid could be summoned.

The late Mrs. MacKinnon had been afflicted with asthma for a number of years but in spite of the various remedies and a prevailing condition she was never known to utter a word of complaint and continued to devote her best interests to her home and family to which she was deeply attached.

Indeed it would be extremely difficult to find another in whom the high ideals of Christian motherhood and Christian charity were more highly exemplified.

Mrs. MacKinnon was born at St. Andrews, P. E. I. sixty-five years ago, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James G. MacDonald of that place. She attended the local school and remained with her widowed father until her marriage.

After her marriage she moved to Charlottetown where Mr. MacKinnon was employed by the Canadian National Railways, and continued to live there until two years ago when, thinking that a change of climate would be beneficial to her health, they moved to Ottawa.

There are left to mourn her passing, her sorrowing husband, and the following sons and daughters: Gerard J., Leo A., Margaret and Bernice in Ottawa, Mary (Mrs. R. J. McCarville), Raymond D., and Reginald J., in Charlottetown and Francis, a novice in the Jesuit Novitiate at Guelph, Ontario. Surviving also are two brothers, Donald J. of St. Andrews, P.E.I., and Alphonis G. of Melrose, Mass. Also twelve grandchildren.

Following Requiem High Mass at the Church of the Assumption, Ottawa, celebrated by Rev. Father J. Brennan the interment took place Saturday, June 10th, in Notre Dame Cemetery, Ottawa. Services at the grave were conducted by Rev. Father W. G. Fogarty.

The number of Mass Cards, spiritual bouquets, telegrams, messages of sympathy, also the beautiful floral tributes testified to the high esteem to which the deceased was held. May her soul rest in peace.

JOHN ALEXANDER MacLEAN

On May 17th, Albion Cross lost the eldest, and a highly respected citizen in the person of John Alexander MacLean, Mr. MacLean, the last survivor of a large family, had been blessed with good health during his life. He was confined to his bed for a period of only seven and one half weeks previous to his death.
