

**Crops Destroyed by Army Worms,
Drought and Rose Bugs—Scar-
city of Water.**

The army worm seems to have nearly run their course in Queens County, and have also nearly disappeared in Suffolk County, excepting in the vicinity of Westhampton, where they have left the upland fields and entered the low permanent meadows on both sides of the bay. Where from 300 to 400 tons of hay are ordinarily cut every year, from present appearances they will not leave twenty-five tons; and cattle heretofore pastured on the meadows after the grass had started its second growth, must now be provided for in some other manner. It is a serious question here and in other localities how stock is to be fed. Many corn fields have been eaten off by the worms and replanted, but in consequence of the drought the seeds have not sprouted, and the prospect of a corn crop with many farmers is extremely dubious, unless there comes speedy and copious rain-falls. All crops are suffering from the renewed and long-continued drought, but especially oats and grass. The pastures begin to look as though singed by a fire. And last in the train of insect enemies which the farmers this season have to contend with, are unprecedented numbers of rose bugs. Wells and cisterns, too, are running dry in many neighbourhoods, and people are forced to transport water, sometimes for a long distance, for the use of their stock as well as for domestic purposes. The oldest inhabitants can hardly remember such a long continued dry spell.—N. Y. Sun.

At a sale at Chicago, Ill., on the 30th ult., the Cochrane & Cannon herds from Canada were disposed of. It is stated that the attendance was large and the prices were the highest obtained since the New York Mill cattle. The seventh and eighth Duchess of Hillhurst sold brought \$8,000 each, and the seventh Duke of Hillhurst brought \$8,900. Forty-three animals were sold for \$38,525, thirty-two cows averaging \$995 and eleven bulls \$622.

A fearful triple tragedy is reported from Jersey City. A woman suffering from malaria, killed her three children, and her husband slept during the murder.

The deaths from sun-stroke occupy about a column daily in the New York papers.

Leave Mount Stewart for Charlottetown at 7 o'clock.

Leaving Charlottetown for Mount Stewart same evenings at from two to three o'clock, according to tide, return to Charlottetown same evenings.

A steamer leaves Steam Navigation Wharf, in this city, for Pictou Landing every Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings at half-past seven o'clock. Returning same days.

A steamer also makes daily trips between Summerside and Point du Chene, and connects with the express train to and from this city.
