Qualify For Advanced Studies OTTAWA, (CP)—Sixty students to date have qualified for ad- vanced studies this fall under new legislation benefiting child- ren of service men who lost their lives due to wartime ser- vice, the veterans affairs depart- ment announced today. Between 200 and 300 students are expected to qualify by Oct. 1 for financial aid and tuition be- yond the secondary-school level, the department said. The new legislation, passed at the last session of Parliament, came into effect July 1. It pro- vides a \$25 monthly allowance and payment of tuition fees for four years. Fathers of 15 of the students served in the First World War and the rest served in the Second World War—one in a special civi- lian job. The fathers of some 11,500 pen- sioned children were killed or died as a result of service in the Second World War. Most of them—more than 7,500—are between nine and 16 years of age and will be graduating from secondary schools between 1956 and 1962. In addition to these are some 1,200 young people below 21 years of age who are receiving pensions because their fathers died as a result of First World War service. Together with children of service men killed in the Korean fight- ing, they are eligible for the educational assistance.
