Federation Of Agriculture News

Dry Weather Hurting

Although growth in most areas of the province, up until last week, was surprisingly good, the effects of the dry weather are definitely appearing. In addition to the cut-worm plague, bleaching of the late grain and stunted growth of turnips and mangels is quite noticeable. The hay crop, especially clover, is not going to be heavy.

Farmers across the province say their hay will be short, even if there is considerable rain during the rest of June. A large percentage of the turnip seed is yet to be put in the ground. Most people are waiting for moisture before sowing it.

County Meetings

Arrangements are pretty well completed for the County Federation meetings next week. Mr. C. T. Fitzandolph, a farmer from Bridgetown, Nova Scotia, former secretary of the Nova Scotia Farmers' Association, past president of the Maritime Federation and for a time during the I. F. A. Conference last year, worked with Mr. Hannam in Ottawa, will represent the C.F.A. He is well qualified to discuss National marketing policies and problems and also knows the story connected with marketing boards and legislation.

Representatives from the New Brunswick Potato Growers Council and from the Newfoundland Federation of Agriculture are also expected.

The afternoon sessions will be devoted to marketing and the reviewing of the potato marketing scheme. Nominations for producer members of the Potato Board and an open discussion on the marketing of eggs, poultry and other farm products will follow. Voting will be limited to the two accredited delegates, the Federation chairman and secretary or alternate from each school district, but the discussions will be open to all Federation members. Registration will commence at 1:30 in the afternoon and the meeting will start promptly at 2:30.

On Wednesday the ladies of the Hunter River and some of the

surrounding Women's Institutes will be serving supper to those attending the meetings. The New Perth and Lorne Valley Women's Institutes will also arrange supper for the Kings County meeting on Friday.

Marketing Board Appointed

The first step toward putting the provisions of our marketing Act into effect was taken last week when the Government appointed the "Prince Edward Island Marketing Board."

This Board is required by our Marketing Legislation to act in an administrative capacity in between the Government and any commodity Boards which might be set up. The Board includes Mr. J. O. C. Campbell as chairman, Mr. H. J. MacDonald of the Department of Agriculture, and Mr. J. L. Dewar of the Federation. It is to this Board that any Industry Group, such as the potato growers, the strawberry producers, the egg and poultry industry, etc. must apply when they want a marketing plan established.

Certain powers will be delegated to the Provincial Board by the Executive Council but, the appointment of the personnel to any Board and the details of the scheme must, in the final analysis be approved by the Government.

Poultry Meeting

On Tuesday evening the Provincial Poultry Committee, which was appointed last year, to act in an advisory capacity to the Department and Federation, met to discuss future plans and policies for marketing eggs and poultry products.

It was revealed that at the present time there are seventy-two grading stations handling eggs in the province. Many of those are not registered but handling eggs as a side-line to draw trade to their other business. There is a great deal of inefficiency in the whole egg business. Many of our local operators are selling in an independent basis and competing with each other, both for the local trade and in selling the product. Although there appears to be no

immediate danger while the floor price on eggs is in effect, yet the general feeling of the meeting was that a great deal could be done if a Board was set up at the present time to put more efficiency into the marketing of eggs and to be prepared to regulate prices and marketing in an orderly way should there be another crisis like that of last fall.

The Dominion Government has warned the poultry producers, to organize and at least help, to produce and market their own products efficiently.

With this in mind and after discussing the great many side issues which are involved, it was decided to call a special meeting of the poultry producers in Charlottetown early in July to discuss the setting up of a province-wide organization, based on an egg and poultry marketing Board which will be applied for, if the meeting agrees. Further discussion on this problem will come up at the County meetings. Investigations are under way to organize with the Western Wheat Pools, a more direct method of importing feed grains and especially poultry feeds next year. According to those closely in touch with the feed problem, there is little or nothing that can be done regarding feed distribution costs this summer because of present selling methods in the West, together with the short supply of available grains.

Gone West

Mr. Dewar left yesterday for an important trip to Upper and Western Canada. His chief mission will be to attend the annual Farm Forum Conference in Brandon next week. When in Ontario and Quebec he will be working on behalf of the Department of Agriculture and Provincial Veterinary Committee to try and procure qualified veterinarians to set up a policy on the Island.

He will also be checking on several Vocational Schools in Ontario for the Department of Education.

It may also be possible that after the Farm Forum meeting in Manitoba, he will continue on to British Columbia for a few days to study their marketing set-up and get some first hand information about the very successful potato marketing Boards in B. C.

It is a promising and happy situation when arrangements can be made to divide travelling expenses and have such a combined mission carried out for the Government Departments and our Farm Organizations. The results from this trip could well be the most important, to our farm groups, for many years.

Word From Sweden

Another letter from Mr. W. R. Shaw in Sweden indicates that they had quite a historical conference. Three hundred delegates, representing thirty countries, were present. He states that he was a member of the committee on world trade and that working out a general pattern of International Commodity Agreements has been their big job.

He goes on to say: "That the important position of I. F. A. P. and farm people occupied in peace, friendliness and prosperity is deeply impressed in the minds of all delegates and it is in this atmosphere that proceedings are being conducted."
