**Martin Sees World Moving To More Hopeful Atmosphere**

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—The world that only a year ago teetered on the brink of thermo-nuclear war in the Cuban crisis has moved into a more hopeful atmosphere in which "a fine blend of caution and risk will have to guide our actions," External Affairs Minister Martin said here.

In an address to the seminar on Canadian-American relations at Windsor University, Mr. Martin said he is convinced that "what we are experiencing now is what may later be called the end of the post-war period."

"More important, there is evidence that the major nations of the world have accepted this

fact in the formulation of their policies and actions." Other observations by the external affairs minister: "Canada - U.S. relations: Because the affairs of the two are

so intertwined, "a great many problems are bound to be a permanent feature of our relationship and a certain amount of friction unavoidable." The basic need, to keep friction to a minimum, is "a continuous dialogue between the two governments, based upon a readiness to seek agreed solutions serving the interest of both."


