THE NEW ILLUMINATING GAS. It Will Soon be Offered for General Use by Household in New York.

It is reported that a cylinder, the new illuminating gas, will soon be offered for general use by household in New York, arrangements for its manufacture being all most completed.

The gas is made from a mixture of the lightest of the hydro-carbons which enter into any of the products of petroleum and coal tar. It is almost a pure carbon vapor. It can be changed into the liquid form by pressure, and confined in the same kind of cans that are used for the liquidation of carbonic acid gas. The plan for using it is to connect these cans with the service pipes and all the contents to pass through them, a regulator permit it to flow out to charge back to the gaseous form. It requires a specially constructed burner, the only one that will burn it at a temperature of 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit. The passage of a cubic foot of gas per hour for a light of fifty candles power. The resulting flame is about an inch wide, three-quarters of an inch high, very brilliant and pure white. It has half the heat of the ordinary kerosene lamp, and it is not so hot as the ordinary gas, as it takes up a relatively small quantity of oxygen. It is claimed that with one foot per hour the new gas will give as much light as a twenty-five candle kerosene burner using the ordinary illuminating gas. The cost of the gas is said to be about one cent per cubic foot, and it is claimed that the cost of gas to consumers will be equal to about ten cents per cubic foot of ordinary gas, and cheaper than the ordinary gas.

The discovery of the new gas was made by a man of the name of the discoverer, Mr. T. L. Wilson, observed that when lime and powdered anthracite were mixed and placed under the influence of electric light, a heavy metallic mass was formed. He would use no force for this, and the result was the formation of a heavy gas amid much explosive force, which burned with a smoky, luminous flame. The compound was found to be a carbide, and it was ascertained that the addition of water caused a double decomposition, with the formation of hydrogen and acetylene. On the ground of the carbide, Mr. Wilson has patented his discovery. It is by the judicious use of such articles of diet that a constitution may be gradually built up until strong enough to resist every tendency to disease.
