Juvenile Theft Case Remanded Until June 19th

A sixteen year old youth, eldest of a gang of four allegedly involved in a number of recent breaks, pleaded guilty in Summerside police court yesterday to a charge of breaking, entering and theft and was remanded until June 19th to permit the case to be discussed with the attorney general in view of the fact that the youth is already under a two year suspended sentence.

The conviction yesterday resulted from a break at the store of Fred Gaudet, Corner of Cedar and Convent Streets, early last Monday morning. His companions, all juveniles, the youngest being only twelve years of age, are presently awaiting trial in juvenile court. During the hearing the crown prosecutor noted the number of breaks that have occurred recently and said it poses a problem for the court to know how to deal with the youthful offenders. Magistrate E. H. Strong indicated his reluctance to send a boy to the penitentiary if there was a hopeful indication that he would resume a useful, law-abiding life. Magistrate Strong indicated however, that law-breaking cannot be treated as a joke. He recalled that a few months ago he had imposed a two year suspended sentence on the youth before the court for his part in the theft of a safe from a Summerside clothing store, and that the sentence had been appealed to supreme court which changed the detention judgement to a two year suspended sentence. In this regard the crown prosecutor stated that when the welfare officer had visited Summerside in connection with the appeal investigation he had failed to contact either the chief of police or the crown prosecutor to obtain information concerning this boys police record.

No Trace Of Ballot Box

MONTREAL (CP) — Voters in Montreal St. Ann riding may never know the total number of ballots cast for their candidates in Monday's federal election. Returning officer Thomas Clarke said one of the 109 ballot boxes was stolen and chances of recovering it are slim. "The box might have been tossed into the St. Lawrence River or the Lachine Canal for all I know."

In any event, the votes in the missing box had little bearing on the outcome of the election in the riding. With 108 polls counted, Gerard Loiselle, an independent Liberal, got 7,739 votes to win the seat. Liberal William Hushion was next with 4,133 votes. Progressive Conservative Gerald Sullivan followed with 2,743 and Cliff Sowery, an other independent Liberal, trailed with 878.
