Construction could start immediately, said company president Harry Gordon, and be completed in 15 months.

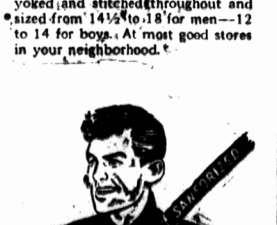
The company has a long-term lease from the Canadian National Railways on property at the foot of Robie street on the shores of Bedford basin.

Strange But True

By F. R. MacArthur Did you know that windows and chimneys were once regarded as personal property, distinct from the rest of the house? They were often mentioned separately in wills.

In the 18th century departing tenants carried off the windows with the rest of their baggage.

In those days the coat of a good bed was high and when special hangings were used it was sometimes enormous. We are told that the bed provided by King James I when he visited Knoie cost 8,000 pounds, being entirely hung with gold and silver tissue. But ordinary beds were often finely carved and ornamented.

In pioneer days in this island the average family owned but one four-poster. Even these were considered sufficiently valuable to be mentioned in wills, as were also the coverings and pillows, that went with them. In the poorer farmhouses trestle beds were put together with wooden pegs and fitted with straw or chaff mattresses. Indeed this scribe can remember a bed of this kind in the home of a friend of his who lived in the Maritimes.

call sleeping on such a bed when he was a mere youngster. Then there was the little trundle beds with low frames resting upon casters. These also had straw mattresses. The other furniture of the pioneer's bedroom was nothing to brag about. A wooden chair and a small table made up the lot.

If you wanted to take a look at yourself after you tumbled out of bed in the morning, you had to use the one small mirror set up in the hall or spare room.

The sanitary arrangements were enough to turn up the most stout noses. Even in the city privies were built with drains discharging into back lots or into the harbor which was regarded as the natural dumping ground for refuse of all kinds. Result: many sections of the city stunk to high heaven. In the country, with its purer air and less congested housing, these careless habits were not so noticeable.

Bathrooms did not exist then. Most people who had a flair for cleanliness took their baths in wooden tubs, once or twice during the winter months, and more frequently in hot weather unless they were fortunate to live near the water when a dip in the brine could be had minus a bathing suit.

How did our forefathers manage without toothbrushes? Most persons cleaned their teeth by rubbing them with a cloth dipped in baking soda or by using tooth-picks of wood or silver.
