

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.
Mr. Walter Shanly retires from the management of the St. Lawrence and Ottawa Railway in a few days.

The Shanly survey party has returned to Winnipeg. They are unable to complete the running of the boundary line between Manitoba and the North West.

A new code of timber regulations for the North West territory has been issued, which it is thought will prove more satisfactory than those previously in force.

ST. JOHN, Dec. 20.

The jury in the Furlong case to-night found a verdict of "not guilty." His companion and alleged associate in crime, James D. Lewin, Jr., skipped his bail to-night, leaving for Augusta, Maine, in the 9 o'clock express for Bangor. Only his brother and a policeman were at the train to say good bye.

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.

The bank of Montreal has paid up to date \$2,000,000 of the Canadian Pacific Railway's land grant bonds. A Winnipegger purchased \$38,000 of them yesterday.

In connection with the recent seizure of watches in Montreal, it is understood that the Collector of Customs has received instruction to have the accused parties arrested and proceeded against criminally.

Mr. Dartley Bentley, Brazilian Consul in Canada, had an interview with Sir Charles Tupper yesterday on matters connected with the Brazilian steamship company. The prospects of working up a profitable trade are very encouraging.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 20.

Lieut. Gen. Anouchine, Governor Gen. of Eastern Siberia, just arrived here, brought news that a steamer of North America Polar Expedition, which has been lost since 1877 has been discovered, and that assistance has been rendered to the crew. It is believed that the discovery refers to the "Jeannette." The despatch adds that the crew have suffered no loss.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.

A London special says: "The Governor of Siberia has issued a proclamation announcing that the Arctic voyaging ship 'Jeannette' is safe, with all on board well and all equipments intact. When he learned that fears were entertained that misfortune had overtaken her, and that relief expeditions were being organized in her interest by the different governments, he equipped and sent out on his own account a party of the most experienced explorers at his command, with most ample powers and most positive instructions. These men stuck to their work despite most dangerous obstacles, until they found traces of the lost ship and finally overtook her. The people on board the 'Jeannette' were much astonished when informed by the Siberian explorers that they had become objects of solicitude of all the civilized nations of the world. After ascertaining that the 'Jeannette' was absolutely safe and all on board well and fully provided for, the Siberians hastened back to report the good news. The Governor of Siberia at once despatched special couriers with the news, to have it sent to London with all possible speed."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.

The Secretary of State received to-day the following telegram from the Charge des Affaires United States at St. Petersburg: "The 'Jeannette' crushed in ice June 11th, latitude 77, longitude 157. Crew embarked in three boats which separated by wind and fog. Number three with eleven men, engineer Melville commanding, reached the mouth of Lena September 19th. Subsequently, number one, with Captain DeLong, Dr. Ambler and twelve men, reached Lena in a pitiable condition. Prompt assistance was sent. Number one not heard from."

In response to the above the following was transmitted by Secretary Frelinghuysen: "Tender hearty thanks of the President to all—authorities or persons who in any way have been instrumental in assisting the unfortunate survivors from the 'Jeannette' or furnishing information to this Government."

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 20.

Engineer Melville forwarded by natives long despatches to Bennett, of the New York Herald. For want of funds they have been forwarded by post addressed to Gen. Ignatieff. On October 29th Nindeman and Noras, the seaman who were in boat No. 1, joined their comrades and stated that Lieut. Delong, Dr. Ambler and twelve others had reached the northern mouth of Lena and were starving. An expedition was at once sent out to rescue them. The survivors lost everything.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 20.

News reached the Government at Jakutsk, eastern Siberia, that on the 14th September three natives of Oulou, near Cape Barhay, 140 versts north of Cape Bekoff, discovered a boat containing 11 men who stated they belonged to the "Jeannette," and had undergone terrible suffering. On hearing the news the District Deputy Governor with doctor and medicines, were immediately despatched to help the shipwrecked sailors, and was instructed to bring them to Jakutsk. The Governor was also instructed to do everything in his power to recover the remainder of the crew, five hundred roubles being given to him to defray first expenses.

ALGIERS, Dec. 20.

It is reported that four hundred persons have been drowned by the bursting of a dam at Perregeux.

BOLTON, Dec. 20.

An explosion occurred about noon. It is now supposed that 180 were killed, as 200 descended into the pit this morning. Ten injured have been recovered. The explosion occurred in the Orrelly Pit, belonging to the Abram Mining Company. The pit was considered to be one of the safest in Lancashire, as neither gunpowder was used for blasting nor furnaces for ventilation, the system of working the mine being purely mechanical. The Arley Pit adjoining was affected by the explosion in the former, only twenty-seven were brought out alive.

COBURG, Dec. 20.

A meeting was held in the Opera house, last night which was crowded to the utmost capacity. Stirling speeches were delivered by the new member and a large number of the prominent men of the party. After the meeting a grand torchlight procession was formed and the victorious candidate triumphantly escorted to his home.
