ESTEEMED EXCHANGES:

The Empire, of London, says: "Sir Charles Tupper, who came over to preside at the meetings of the two British Columbian-Yukon companies in which he is interested, returned to Canada on Wednesday Sir Charles, the Grand Old Man of the Dominion, is most active—both physically and mentally as well as the youngest-looking man of his years in the whole British Empire."

The Empire, of London: All these scandals about Panama, Dreyfus, Esterhazy, and others clearly prove the utterly rotten state of French public life, and serve to show that the republic is no better than the Empire or the Monarchy where the spoils of office and the abuse of power are concerned. Perhaps the most disquieting feature of the affair is the manner in which all these scoundrels who are selling their country regard their acts. They see nothing abnormal in the sale and barter of political influence, military secrets, secrets of Justice.

It has now come to a direct tug-of-war between Mr. Tarte and the respectable Liberals of Quebec.

An old song used to say of a peculiar and original composition that "the more you try to pull it off it's sure to stick the faster."

Mr. Tarte is of this nature, and it is safe to assume that he will remain and rule.

It is queer that while the French Liberals rebel against Mr. Tarte because of his funny ways, the Ontario Liberals so far as represented by Sir Richard Cartwright, should seem to be quite contented under him.

But we do not believe that honest Ontario Liberals are at all pleased either with Mr. Tarte or with Mr. Hardy's alliance with that Minister.—Mail and Empire.

LONDON December 29.—Colonel John Hay, the United States ambassador, had a conference yesterday with Sir Thomas Sanderson, the permanent secretary of the foreign office, on the sealing question. The Marquis of Salisbury was absent.

BERLIN, December 29.—The National Zeitung yesterday denies that the tariff negotiations have been broken off, adding that they have only just commenced and will continue.

WASHINGTON, December 29.—The expected conference between Secretary Alger and Hon. Mr. Sifton did not take place today. Secretary Alger had overrated his strength and found that he was not sufficiently recovered to undertake the work of arranging details for the relief of the expedition. The Canadian visitors are to remain in Washington for a few days, however, so that the conference is merely postponed for a short time.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Dec. 29.—The British cruiser Leander and the torpedo destroyer Virago have arrived on their way to Equimalt. The ships left Portsmouth, England, last August, sailing at an average speed of twelve knots. The cruiser Phaeton, with the destroyer Sparrow Hawk, following the Leander and Virago, and is expected to arrive here within two weeks. The Phaeton and Leander are sister ships, as also the Sparrow Hawk and Virago. With these vessels added to the Equimalt squadron Great Britain will have the strongest fleet by far that has ever assembled in the Pacific ocean.
