Ch'town Teams Set For Action

The Maritime five-pin bowling championships gets underway tomorrow in Shelburne, N.S. with an estimated nine teams scheduled to take part in the tournament.

There will be two teams representing Charlottetown when action gets underway at the Nova Scotia Lanes. Seamen's All-Stars and the Rollaway Juniors will be representing the Capitol City.

The Maritime competition was staged at the Charlottetown Rollaway, last year, and the tournament drew a large following as the teams battled for the Maritime title.

The Rollaway Juniors held their own in last year's competition and when the final statistics were compiled the Charlottetown youngsters had garnered a third place tie in the tri-province tourney.

Seamen's team this season will have last year's players back in the fold with the exception of Vic Williams. Williams has been a top-notch performer with local bowling teams over the years, but has reached the stage in his career where he prefers his slippers and a big easy chair in front of the fire-place to the strain of a Maritime championship tournament.

The remainder of the Seamen's team includes: Roy MacDonald, Gordon Gallant, George Kays, Stanley 'Dinger' Johnson and Louis Smith. Smith is also a new face on this year's edition of the team.

The Rollaway team will have: Reg 'Junior' Flanagan, Len Ellsworth, Emmett Ellsworth, John 'Beaver' Arsenault, Keith Doyle and Rickey Burns hurling for them.

This will mark the 13th consecutive year for the Maritime five-pin tournament and the teams will be competing for the Seamen's Brothers trophy which has been in circulation since the inauguration of the competition.

We mentioned that Louis Smith will be performing with the Seamen's aggregation and they are mighty glad to have Mr. Smith along. Last year Louis wasn't on the team and when the Cornwallis team said they needed a bowler to complete their team the local squad recommended they pick-up Louis. Smith ended up winning the high average trophy for the three day competition and also obtained an award for recording the most 300 games.

Tid Bits From Here And There

Joe Beckett, former British heavyweight boxing champion who died a month ago in apparent poverty, actually left an estate of \$90,566, his will disclosed Tuesday. For years after residents of Southampton, where Beckett died at 72, had been giving him food and other supplies in the belief that the 1919-23 British Empire champion was too poor to buy his own. The will directed that the money be shared equally by his three sons and two daughters.

Jackie Parker, the celebrated quarterback Toronto Argonauts signed two years ago for an estimated \$27,500 annually in salary and bonuses, has signed his 1965 contract with the Eastern Football Conference club. It had been rumored that he planned to retire this year and also that he would not be invited to the Argo camp. There was no estimate on the terms of Parker's contract but it was reported devoid of no-cut clauses and guaranteed special bonuses.

Masters champion, Jack Nicklaus will not compete in the \$100,000 Colonial National Invitation Golf Tournament, officials announced Tuesday. Nicklaus will remain in Columbus, Ohio, with his wife, who is expecting her third child.

Cincinnati Reds traded veteran relief pitcher Bill Henry to San Francisco Giants Tuesday for reliever Jim Duffalo. Last year Duffalo was 5-1 in 35 games and had an earned run average of 2.92. Henry was 2-2 last year and his earned run average was 0.85.

French Society Launches Protest

DRUMMONDVILLE, Que. (CP)—The St. Jean Baptiste Society of the area of Nicolet, Que., has protested the exclusive use of English by National Hockey League president Clarence Campbell in his presentation of the Stanley Cup to the Montreal Canadiens.

In a telegram sent Monday to NHL governors, the society objected to what it called Campbell's "ignorance" of the French language.

Commenting on the protest, Campbell said in Montreal Tuesday he regrets he cannot speak French because "there's nothing I would like to be more able to do."

"I am not sufficiently fluent to speak French in public, but all my sympathies are toward every cordial relation possible with my French friends," Mr. Campbell presented the

cup to Montreal team captain Jean Beliveau Saturday night after the Canadiens defeated Chicago Black Hawks 4-0 in the seventh game of their best-of-seven final playoff series.

Campbell's brief remarks in English were interrupted by boos and shouts as he stood at centre ice in the Montreal Forum to present the cup. Moments later, Beliveau's acceptance speech in French and English was received in complete quiet.

The uproar during Mr. Campbell's remarks apparently resulted from his suspension of Montreal's star right winger Maurice Richard in 1955 for the last three games and the playoffs of that season.

Richard's 1955 suspension resulted from his hitting a Boston Bruins player with a stick and his slugging of a linesman.

Crowds Of Montreal Fans Honor Stanley Cup Champs

By JOE DUPIS MONTREAL (CP) — Crowds three to 10 tiers deep lined an eight-mile downtown route in sunny spring weather Tuesday to cheer the Montreal Canadiens, winners of hockey's Stanley Cup.

Between cheers and hand-waving, the enthusiastic fans chanted "halte-la, halte-la—les Canadiens sont-la," a kind of musical rah-rah in French which, in rough translation, means, "halt, halt—the Canadiens have arrived."

Canadians won the Stanley Cup Saturday night, beating Chicago Black Hawks 4-0 in the final game of their best-of-seven playoff.

The team, driving in 13 open convertibles led by six motorcycle policemen and a 30-piece band on a fire truck, were 15

minutes late arriving for a reception at City Hall prior to a city-sponsored buffet Tuesday night. They had some difficulty leaving the Forum where the cavalcade began because of a pressing throng of fans.

GREETING EACH PLAYER Mayor Jean Drapeau greeted each player on the steps of City Hall. First to arrive was team captain Jean Beliveau, outstanding star of the team's triumph, and Bobby Rousseau, also a big goal-scorer in the Stanley Cup win.

Each convertible carried two players. Bringing up the rear was coach Toe Blake, club president David Molson and general manager Sam Pollock.

The cavalcade traversed the route slowly in orderly fashion. There were no disturbances, though several times fans scrambled through the crowds to seek autographs from their idols.

The Stanley Cup and the Conn Smythe Trophy, which was won by Beliveau as the outstanding playoff performer, rode with the band, glistening like jewels in the bright sun.

Both trophies were carried into the mayor's office, where

the team was invited to sign the city's golden book.

HOPES FOR THREE WINS An obviously excited Mayor Drapeau praised the Canadiens and expressed the hope they could keep winning the coveted Stanley Cup until 1967.

In that year, Montreal will stage the world's fair "and we can give you an absolutely tremendous reception right on the fair site in honor of three straight Stanley Cup wins."

He spoke in both French and English.

"Accept our testimony of gratitude," he told the team.

Coach Blake, wearing a nervous smile, praised his own club for "giving me more thrills than any other team I've ever coached."

After his brief speech in English, the coach moved away from the battery of microphones in the mayor's office. The mayor whispered to him to say something in French and Blake complied with a few brief words.

Both Beliveau and Molson gave short addresses in French.

Beatles' Tour May Be Dropped LONDON (Reuters)—The Beatles' multi-million dollar tour of the United States, planned for August, may be cancelled under a ban on the Anglo-American exchange of jazz and rock 'n' roll groups announced Tuesday.

The Musicians' Union announced the ban, blaming "abuses by American promoters in booking British groups for additional engagements not included in their contracts."

Harry Francis, assistant secretary of the Musicians' Union, said it is not possible to forecast how long the ban would last "but if it is still in force in August the Beatles' tour will be off."

Sherbrooke Tops Nelson For Second Straight Win

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP)—Sherbrooke Beavers posted their second straight victory Tuesday night when they downed Nelson (B.C.) Maple Leafs 4-1 in the Allan Cup best-of-seven final series.

Sherbrooke was in the first game which it won 7-3 Sunday night proved too strong in the third period for the Western entry.

With the game 2-1 moving into the final stanza, Sherbrooke got two more goals and Nelson was unable to match.

The Beavers scored two of their four goals while the Western squad was shorthanded, one in the first and another in the second.

Playing coach Georges Roy made it 1-0 at 17:39 of the first period with Nelson defenceman Bill Steinke in the penalty box.

Then at the mid-way mark of the second period Simon Nolel put the Beavers ahead 2-0 with Buck Crawford of the Leafs scoring a penalty.

Less than two minutes later, Walt Peacosh beat Serge Aubry for the Leafs' lone counter of the evening. Georges Guilbeault and Rene Pepin rounded out the Beavers' scoring.

Pepin with his third goal and assists on Roy's and Nolel's markers, was the big point-getter for the Eastern club.

OUTSTANDING GOALIE Sherbrooke dominated play in the first period and only the outstanding work of Jim Letcher in the Nelson nets held the score to 1-0.

After the penalty to Steinke, Nolel advanced up the right side but was chased to the corner. However, he managed to relay the puck to Pepin who fired a shot which Letcher stopped. Roy picked up Pepin's rebound and fired it behind the Nelson netminder.

Nolel's second period marker proved to be the winner. He was put in the clear by Pepin and defied two Nelson defenders before cutting in front of the net to lift the puck over the fallen goaltender.

Peacosh teamed with Ken McTeer and Doug Kilburn on a three-way passing effort at the 10:20 mark, with the Sherbrooke defence caught out of position.

The puck moved to Peacosh as he stood uncovered 15 feet in front of Aubry. He beat Aubry cleanly.

The third period was a hard-fought affair and threatened to get out of hand, with playing coaches Bobby Kromm of the Leafs and Roy trading some swipes with their sticks.

The shots on goal were almost as one-sided as the final score, as Letcher made 45 stops to 23 for Aubry.

Third game will be played at Sherbrooke at 8 p.m. Thursday night with game time slated for 8:30 p.m. EDT.

CHICAGO (AP)—Two home runs each by Willie Stargell and Jerry Lynch powered the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 6-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs Tuesday, with Stargell's three-run shot in the ninth inning the clinching blow.

Lynch homered in the second inning, then the second connected back-to-back to the sixth for a 3-2 Pirate lead. Ron Santo's run-scoring single in the eighth tied it, but Stargell settled matters with two out in the ninth.

Winning reliever Al McBean struck out against Ernie Brolio and Andre Rodgers drew a walk. They against Ted Abernathy, Bill Virdon singled and Don Clendenon fouled out before Stargell smacked his fourth homer of the season.

The Cubs loaded the bases with one out in the bottom of the ninth against McBean, but the relief ace choked off the rally as the Pirates snapped a losing string at four games. They had lost 10 of their last 11.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Joe Pepitone doubled across two runs and scored another as the New York Yankees erupted for four runs in the fourth inning and held on for a 5-3 triumph over Cleveland Tuesday night.

The outburst came after rain had delayed the game for 47 minutes. Arturo Lopez started the rally with an infield single off Sonny Siebert, who had retired the Yankees in order the first three innings.

NEW YORK (AP)—Al Jackson, a loser in three previous starts, scattered eight hits and Yogi Berra, making his initial National League start, collected two singles, pacing the New York Mets to a 2-1 victory over Philadelphia Tuesday night.

Jackson, who had been relegated to bullpen duty after giving up 14 earned runs in 15 innings as a starter, pitched out of a first inning jam and blanked the Phillies for eight innings while setting a team record with 11 strikeouts.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Jesus Alou and Willie Mays hit two-run homers before Ray Sadecki could retire a batter, and the San Francisco Giants sailed past St. Louis 9-2 Tuesday night, snapping the Cardinals' five-game winning streak.

Jim Hart added a two-run homer in the third inning off reliever Ron Taylor, giving Giant right-hander Juan Marichal an early bulge. Marichal checked the Cardinals on six hits for his fourth victory in six decisions.

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Don Lock's fifth-inning triple drove in the go-ahead run in the Washington Senators' 4-2 victory over Kansas City Tuesday night.

Lock's hit scored Ken McMullen, who had singled, breaking a 2-2 tie and helping righthander Phil Ortega pick up his first victory after three losses. Ortega needed three innings of scoreless relief aid from Steve Ridzik after Ed Charles led off the Kansas City seventh with a triple.

DETROIT (AP)—Chicago White Sox capitalized on five Detroit errors for six unearned runs in the first four innings and went on to score a 10-6 victory over the Tigers Tuesday night. The White Sox scored five unearned runs in the first in-

ning after Norm Cash bobbled Floyd Robinson's grounder for what should have been the third out. Ron Hansen knocked in two of the runs with a single.

The Tigers tied the score in the second inning with the help of Don Wert's two-run homer.

But Chicago went ahead for good in the third when it scored three more runs on three singles and three Tiger errors by Al Kalina, Wert and George Thomas.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Hank Aaron exploded for two home runs and Ed Mathews added one in support of Tom Cloninger's five-hitter Tuesday night as Milwaukee clobbered Houston 9-3 before a paid crowd of only 913.

The crowd was a record low in the Braves' 13-year stay in Milwaukee.

Cloninger didn't give up a hit through 5 1-3 innings, allowing only two baserunners on walks.

Pete Schmidt Downs Savoie

MONTREAL (CP)—Peter Schmidt of Toronto regained the Canadian welterweight boxing championship by scoring a 12-round split decision over Armando Savoie of Montreal Tuesday night.

Schmidt gained the victory by a slim margin, scoring heavily on points as Savoie was content to wait for openings for hard blows to the head.

At 144 pounds, the veteran Savoie gave away 1½ pounds and five years to his younger opponent.

Two judges scored the match 56-54 in Schmidt's favor, using the five-point must system. The third judge favored Savoie 56-55.

It was the second recent meeting for the pair, both former Canadian welterweight title holders, who fought to a draw here March 30 in a non-title bout.

Schmidt, who lost his title last fall in Toronto to Joey Durelle of Trois-Rivieres, Que., was a last-minute replacement as Savoie's opponent.

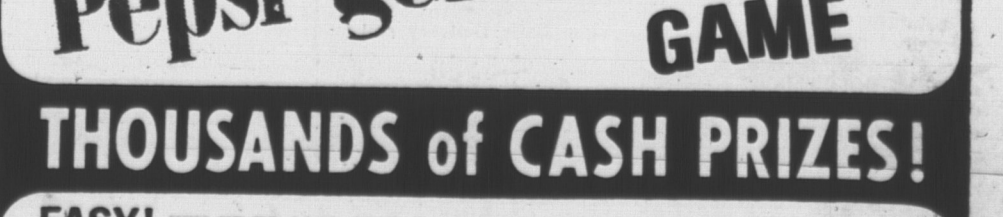
