Warns Against — Continued from page 5 It is of the utmost importance that movements of cattle to the market should be on the basis of only the best finished animals and the needs of the trade in any particular portion of the country. Market needs therefore, should be specially considered until the American embargo is lifted and markets can assume their normal movement.

Deficiency Area — "There should be little difficulty in this area, which is deficient to the extent of almost 40 millions of pounds of beef annually, in preserving a proper relationship in prices based on twenty-five cents for good steers. In this connection normal differentials in price as between grades should apply in market quotations.
