Miss Alice May Harrison of Moncton, N. B., for many years music supervisor in Moncton schools was among the recipients of honorary doctorate degrees on Saturday, August 14th, at Mt. Allison University as the University marked the 100th anniversary of education for women at Mt. Allison. Miss Harrison was born at Debec, Carleton County daughter of the late Rev. William Harrison, D.D., and Carrie E. Harrison. Miss Wyatt extended a welcome on behalf of the Abegweit Chapter of the I.O.D.E. and stated that the sponsors were very encouraged by the magnificent display of gladioli and table decorations as well as the many new exhibitors and added donors to this year's show. The Hon. C. C. Baker said that since the Abegweit Chapter of the I.O.D.E. conceived the idea two years ago, the annual flower show has taken place at the capital. He stated that the show goes hand in hand with the Rural Beautification Society's projects, as flowers play an important role in the beautification of country or town. Mr. Baker said that in his lengthy travels, no place had he seen flowers more wonderful than our own and stated that the Department of Agriculture is always willing to help in the advancement of such a worthy exhibition.

Mr. Baker then declared the annual Provincial Flower Show (the third) officially open. The guest speaker, Mr. S. C. Wright, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for P.E.I., gave a word picture of his recent visit to Al-

berta, where he attended a meeting of the provincial deputy ministers of agriculture in Edmonton. He told of taking a tour of parts of Alberta and of the many sun-baked wheat growers, resulting in a great loss to the mining town of Frank, Alberta, which was practically wiped out in 1903 by a landslide and rebuilt near the previous site, and to Fort MacLeod, the first post set up by the North West Mounted Police. The evening program consisted of a short musical, presented by violinist, Miss Mary Windsor of Newton Highlands, Mass., and vocal solos by Mrs. Erland Ramsay of Summerside, Miss Helen Holman was piano accompanist for the violin solos.
