

W.A. Bryenton Wins Prov. Skeet Shooting Ch'ship

Shot under ideal weather conditions the P. E. I. closed skeet shooting championships, sponsored by the Charlottetown Skeet Club were held on Dominion Day. Many club records and individual records were broken by the large number of members taking part.

W. A. Bryenton was declared high gun and provincial champion for 1954. Shooting one perfect round Mr. Bryenton became the first member to break 25 straight at the local club grounds. Besides winning the Calvert Trophy and provincial championship badge Mr. Bryenton also walked away with the H. C. Atkinson prize for being the first member to break 25 straight at the club field.

Glydon Willis of Kensington was declared the winner of the Class A event with a score of 85, and R. E. Hyndman runner up with 83.

Class B saw Ron Atkinson with a score of 74 as the winner and T. M. Gillies as runner up with 62.

Hugh Simpson was the winner in Class C with a score of 67 and Ralph E. Jenkins the runner up with 64.

A five man team from the Moncton Gun Club although not competing for the Provincial championship in attendance at the event H. O. Whitman of Moncton was the high scorer among the visitors with a score of 90. The local club members are much indebted to the visiting gunners for attending, as they added a great deal to the success of the Dominion Day shoot.

A large number of visitors were in attendance at all times and closely followed the keen competition as many gunners were battling for top place right until the last shot was fired.

The two man team event was won by Willie Bryenton and Ron Atkinson, and five man team by O. S. Harper, T. M. Gillies, A. C. Hogan, W. A. Bryenton and R. E. Jenkins.

Also providing a great deal of sport throughout the day was the "Bear Trap". This proved to be a competition akin to actual field shooting, with targets going at irregular angles and elevations. Six prizes were donated for this event and were won in the following order: W. A. Bryenton, Glydon Willis, Hugh Simpson, Con Gallant, Lloyd McCallum, and Ron Atkinson.

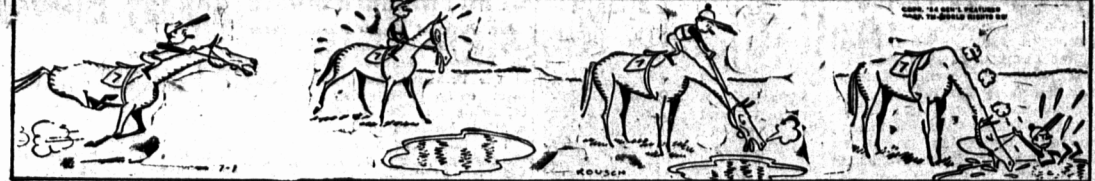

The LaBatt Open at Montreal against the top golfers in Canada and the U.S.A. he sank a 60 foot putt to qualify in the upper half after two days of play. Five years ago in the N. B.-P. E. I. tournament after a mediocre start he fired a 59 to take over a lead which he never relinquished to win the N. B.-P. E. I. Amateur and Open Championship. It has always been the same story with him. A mediocre start and a brilliant finish. In every tournament except the one this week at Ashburn his first round score has been his highest.

Until another comes along to prove his right to the claim Cecil Dowling must rate as the greatest money player in the Island sporting realm. No other athlete in our memory has delivered so many times with the chips on the line as the fast talking, quick thinking little professional at the Belvedere Golf Course. Dowling has had his greatest moments in golf but he has had some big ones in hockey even though his hockey career has been hampered during the past several seasons by a bad knee.

What Dowling did on the last round of the Nova Scotia Open at the Ashburn Golf Course on Wednesday afternoon borders on the unbelievable. He carded a brilliant two-under par 65 to finish second in the tournament and win second place money of \$150.00 among the professionals. The 26 year old Charlottetown pro was seven strokes below professional Jimmy Walker of the Ken-Wo Club with only nine holes left to play. He not only wiped away those seven strokes on the last nine but birdied the last hole to beat Walker by a stroke. Jimmy had to be content with third place and \$75.00. For Dowling that one stroke meant \$75.00.

Kas Zabowski, the professional at the Ashburn Golf Course won the tournament with a four round score of 272. Zabowski was favored to win before the tournament opened because of his outstanding golfing ability and also the fact that he was playing on the home course. He shot rounds of 68-70-64-70 while Dowling had rounds of 71-71-69-65. Zabowski's round of 64 was the hottest of the tournament while Dowling's round of 65 was second best.

Dowling had good and bad luck on his last round. He incurred two penalty strokes and he three-putted one green for his bad luck. On another hole he was off the fairway on his second shot. His third shot was a 260 yard spoon shot over the trees. The ball would have rolled over the green but for the fact that it bounced struck a golfer on the leg and stopped four feet from the cup. Dowling sank the putt for a birdie four. On his first nine Wednesday the Charlottetown professional had 34 and on the second nine 31. He had six pars and three birdies on the last nine.

Wednesday was not the first time that Dowling has come from behind with a brilliant finish to end in the upper brackets. Last year in

Trabert And Seixas Whip Rosewall, Hood In Doubles

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—The erratic U.S. Davis cup doubles team of power-hitting Tony Trabert and slicing Vic Seixas had one of its good days Thursday and whipped the Australian tennis twins, Ken Rosewall and Lew Hoad in the semi-finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships.

The Americans won 6-3, 7-5, 3-6, 4-6, 8-6, in the highlight of the day's play before 15,000 tennis fans on the centre court.

In the other men's doubles semi-final, Aussies Rex Hartwig and Mervyn Rose defeated Budge Patty of Los Angeles and Gardner Mulloy of Coral Gables, Fla., 4-6, 6-4, 6-2, 6-1. Both Americans looked tired and played as if they were saving their strength. Once in the final set, 40-year-old Mulloy, who had been mistiming his shots

badly, solemnly put on a pair of spectacles.

Maureen Connolly of San Diego, Calif., easily beat Mrs. Betty Pratt of South Orange, N.J., 6-1, 6-1, in one of the women's singles semi-finals while Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., upset Doris Hart of Coral Gables, Fla., 2-6, 6-3, 6-3 in the other semi-final.

Miss Brough's victory was something of a surprise because Miss Hart was runner-up last year and had won in 1950. The women's final will be held Saturday.

Although Hoad and Rosewall were defending doubles champions, they were seeded third, a notch below Seixas and Trabert. So Thursday's victory for the Americans followed form. But they didn't get it without a battle.

In the ninth game of the fifth set, with Hoad serving, the Americans held match point twice. But Seixas, who had been carrying the burden, began netting too often and the score went to 5-5 and 6-6. The Americans finally broke Hoad in the 14th game after the Aussie had saved three more match points.

The climax of the tournament comes today when the old fox of touring tennis, Jaroslav Drobný meets the young fighter from Australia, Rosewall, for the men's singles title.
