Eden Welcomes Red Arms Cut

LONDON (Reuters) — Prime Minister Eden said today the British government welcomed Russia's reduction of its armed forces. He told the House of Commons: "We have in fact reduced our armaments considerably and are still doing so. "If it so happens that everyone starts to catch this habit, we shall have no objection. I think we are entitled to say we were the first to start it."

Eden was replying to a Labor member, Frederick Bellenger, who asked whether Russia's "radical reduction in conventional armaments" would have any effect on the British government's plans for Britain.

Preliminary Hearing In Lee Case Continued

The preliminary hearing in the case of Harold Clement Lee, charged with theft and public mischief, was continued yesterday morning at the Magistrate K.M. Martin, J.P. Nicholson appeared for the crown and J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C. for the defence.

Only one witness was heard, Constable Gordon Humphreys, R.C.M.P. in charge of the Identification Section at Charlottetown. Questioned by Mr. Nicholson, the witness said "I arrived at Hampton shortly after noon on April 20, where I saw Chief of Police C.W. MacArthur, receiving a key to the car pointed out to me. I later found the vehicle was registered in the name of Harold Lee."

The witness told of staying with Lee until later in the afternoon and then proceeding on the road toward Charlottetown to a point where footprints had been reported. Constable Humphreys said "I stayed at this point until 5:00 p.m. before returning to Hampton where I turned the key over to Sgt. Davis." He said that he then returned to the city where he received the key again from Sgt. Humphreys at about 8:00 p.m.

Asked when he next saw the car, witness said that he had seen it that evening when he checked to see that it was locked and again the next morning. He did not examine the car on Friday evening because of darkness. He began his investigation at 8:30 on Saturday morning by taking photos of the interior. After taking three photographs Cst. Humphreys stated that he then started to make a fingerprint survey and systematic search. On the floor of the rear seat of the car he had found a fifty cent piece and a canvas bag which contained more coins, totalling \$17. Continuing the search he told of finding further coins in the amount of eleven cents in the ash tray on the dashboard.

During the search of the front seat of the car, witness said he had noticed an opening at the top right corner of the kick-board and when he reached in with his hand he could feel the corner of some paper. Cst. Humphreys stated "I removed the right side of the kick-board and found a wad of money, folded double with an elastic band around it. Witness said he then counted the money with another constable as witness. The kick-board he said did not appear as though it had been removed. The bills contained in the bundle totalled \$110 comprising, three, tens; eight, fives; sixteen, twos and eight, ones.

Asked by Mr. Nicholson, "after finding money what did you do?" Cst. Humphreys, "My curiosity was aroused, then removed the left side of the kick-board, discovering another wad of money."

Freight Traffic From Province Up For April

The report released yesterday by the Canadian National Railways, Atlantic Division, for the month of April shows a substantial increase over April 1955 in the number of carloads shipped from the Province, via the Borden-Tormentine ferry.

The commodity responsible for the greater part of the increase was (1955 in brackets), potatoes 1,234 (831) followed by turnips 134 (115); livestock 102 (99); butter and cheese 8 (2); canned goods 9 (4) and hay and straw 3 (4). A number of items showed various declines such as meats 24 (33); miscellaneous 63 (123) less carload lots 60 (70); eggs 4 (10); roughwood 6 (27) and fish 0 (2).

On the import side the figures show a decline of 190 carloads, 1,198 as compared with 1388 for April 1955. Much of this is accounted for by: autos 72 (109); Fruit 14 (21); Fertilizer 46 (101); gas and oils 133 (246); lime 63 (124); machinery 14 (27); sand, stone, gravel, brick and cement 30 (48) and roofing 5 (13). Showing an increase were: coal 119 (75); less carload lots 281 (260); meats 21 (15); sugar 17 (12); burlap 14 (6); and miscellaneous 118 (104).

Says Grants Are Unfair To N.S.

HALIFAX (CP)—President A. E. Kerr of Dalhousie University said Thursday the system of federal grants to universities recommended by the royal commission on arts, letters and sciences, is "grossly unfair to universities of Nova Scotia."

Nova Scotia receives \$80.5 per student, the lowest in Canada. Newfoundland is highest with \$75.64. British Columbia, next to Nova Scotia, receives \$69.42.

Dr. Kerr told the university's graduating class the grants should "be determined by some more rational consideration than the total population of the provinces in

country he is supposed to be serving. "I think my record in Canada will stand up," Mr. Howe declared to noisy Liberal applause. The American-born minister said he has been a Canadian citizen for 43 of his 48 years in Canada.

Mr. Howe said the government feels it has a responsibility to help find an outlet for Alberta's gas because of the federal policy of keeping all sources of energy for Canada first.

Trans-Canada's backers had spent the last two years carrying out preliminary work necessary before the project could be started. So far the government had done "absolutely nothing" in financial help.

Trans-Canada had met with delays in financing its project because the application to export gas to U. S., means for U. S. federal power commission, had met with probably the most violent opposition in the FCC's history.

BITING CRITICISM

Mr. Diefenbaker made a biting criticism of the use of closure earlier this week and asked the prime minister why he had not spoken to "explain why the rights of parliament are being flouted away."

"Why is he so fearful of the facts?" he asked of the prime minister. "Why is he afraid to allow the true facts of this nefarious scheme to be elucidated?"

Mr. Diefenbaker described Trans-Canada as the governments "pampered pet."

The government had held to Trans-Canada, refusing to consider alternative proposals, despite a five-year record of unfulfilled promises by the company that it could complete financing and start the construction long before now.

"The record year after year is one of deceptive finance, false promises and unjustified hopes."
