#### Outrageous Doctor's Bill Keeps Family In Debt

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: My annual income is \$4,500, which just won't stretch to cover my family's maintenance needs, plus medical bills.

Having read much about hyperinsulinism, and having had a depressing health problem for years, I decided to invest in a medically supervised glucose tolerance test to see if "low blood sugar" was involved.

To make a long story short, I went from one doctor to another, and one hospital to another, for months before I found a specialist who knows how to run the tests and outline the treatment.

Having located the specialist, I had to wait another three weeks for a check-up. But I shall never forget the first encounter. His clinic was a marvel of modern equipment, coping with no doubt the latest in medicine.

Waiting my turn, I studied a sign near the receptionist's window which said: "You are invited to discuss the doctor's fee with him, in order to avoid misunderstanding at a later time." Oh, how I wish I had taken that advice. But I assumed his fees would be in line with others I had encountered.

I was hospitalized immediately after the consultation. The doctor then inaugurated a series of tests and a program of treatment, the latter continuing after I left the hospital. The hospital bill was stiff, but my insurance paid most of it. But you should have seen the doctor's bill! I thought it had to be a mistake, but the clinic billing stated the charge was correct. When I tried to reach the doctor by telephone, he was out of the country, at a medical convention. I wrote him, respectfully requesting his reconsideration of his charges, in view of my financial means. His answer: "The charges stand; but may be paid over a period of several months if necessary."

The statement is in the final chapter of a proof copy of Churchill's book, "Step by Step," published in 1939. The chapter had been written in March, six months before Hitler invaded Poland, setting off the war.

The proof copy is part of a collection of Churchill's writings presented to Columbia University by Daniel Longwell of New York, Mo., formerly an editor of Life and Time magazines and an executive of Doubleday and Co. He said the proof copy had been mislaid and was only recently found.

chapter expressed a common Conservative party opinion that England should stay out of the war and let Hitler and Stalin battle it out.

But by the time the book was published, it had become clear that Hitler was a mortal threat to England, Longwell said.

RECALLED NAPOLEON  
The chapter also suggested that Hitler might make the same mistake as Napoleon by invading Russia, which he did on June 22, 1941.

Churchill wrote of Hitler: "Will he draw upon himself the same resentments and deep-flowing tides of mass antagonism as brought the great genius of the 19th century (Napoleon) to failure and to sorrow; or will some flash of inspiration light for him the future and reveal the shadow of the past?" Churchill also suggested that Hitler might have hurt himself by intervening in the Spanish civil war, even though it looked at the time that Germany had netted "nothing but profit."

Yet it may be that in the end their tramping down of the Spanish republic will be found to have ranged against the Nazi regime wage-earning classes in every country, not excluding Germany which will be a heavy load for any autocratic government," he wrote.

#### Food And Money Savers "Planned Over" Recipes

If the two-job family homemaker isn't careful, the weekly food bill will often almost equal her pay check! The natural tendency to waste food must be watched, for when plenty of money is coming in and there is little time to cook, the use of food odiments (which some persons regard as inconsequential "leftovers") may not seem important. But wasted food can soon count up to a dollar—and dollars—are worth saving.

POSSIBLE WAYS  
Use the odiments; yes, all of them in "quick-cook" soups, skillet melanges of rice with meat, fish and vegetables; in varied omelets as in Spain; in hors d'oeuvres as in France; or in end-of-the-week casseroles; or in fruit. Blettes or other "quick-cook" desserts.

We'll have more about this time-and-money-saving method tomorrow. Shredded Lettuce Tossed with Vinaigrette-Caper Dressing Portuguese Savorily Boiled Beef and Vegetables (Cabbage, Potatoes, Carrots, Turnips and Rice) Cake-Crumb Souffle

CAKE-CRUMB SOUFFLE  
2 1/2 c. milk  
2 tsp. cold starch  
2 tsp. cold water  
3/4 c. granulated sugar  
1 1/2 tsp. salt  
2 eggs, separated  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 1/2 c. fine cake crumbs (from cake several days old)  
Pitcher cream or chocolate sauce

Scald milk in double boiler. Mix cornstarch with boiling water and stir in. Mix together sugar, salt, egg yolks and vanilla; stir into milk and cook-stir 2 min. Stir in cake crumbs. Beat egg whites and fold in. Transfer to buttered 3-pt. baking dish; bake 25 min. at 350 degrees F. or until puffy and brown. Serves 6. Pass cream or chocolate sauce.

THE CHEF SUGGESTS  
When shredding lettuce, use both light and dark leaves; keep vinaigrette dressing on hand and vary flavor as desired with capers; or chopped olives; or minced anchovies. Cook enough Portuguese Beef Vegetables and Rice for two meals. Use crumbed dry cake in the souffle.

#### Safety Council Sponsors Special Meetings At CQRH

At the second meeting the guest speaker was Jack Kirby, who brought to the attention of the audience many ideas concerning "Home safety" in the field of electricity. He pointed out many ways in which the average citizen is actually playing with fire, in the manner in which we misuse electrical equipment. He pointed out that pumps should be on a separate circuit. He also recommended that rubber plugs be used in preference to any other variety.

The topic at another meeting was "Home and Barn Safety", a film "The Miracle of Paradise Valley" was shown. Mrs. Craswell introduced Mrs. Cudmore, who, during the course of her remarks, stated that last year in this province, 96 persons had died through accidents—52 of those were in the home or around the farm. Princes Edward Island had the highest accident rate in the nation with 80.4 percent per 1000. Causes of accidents were (in percentage order) falls, fires, suffocation and poison. She urged everyone to use better judgment and check equipment to see that all is in good working order.
