Cholera continues to spread in Japan. Forest fires are raging in Massachusetts. Dysentery is prevalent at Fredericton, N. B. A fatal case occurred on Monday.

The heat in New York continues intense. Last week's record showed a greater number of deaths than any week for ten years past.

The Agricultural Department at Washington reports the value of the hay crop in New England to be more than sixty-six millions of dollars, of which Maine produces more than any other State.

The new Episcopal Church in Rome, the foundation stone of which was recently laid, is to prove a costly affair. Upon the foundations alone \$60,000 has been spent; the site cost \$6,000; about \$70,000 more is wanted to complete the building.

A band of Canadian Cree Indians has been captured in the Milk River district by United States troops while marauding. The stolen horses were taken from them, and they were ordered to return to the Canadian side of the line.

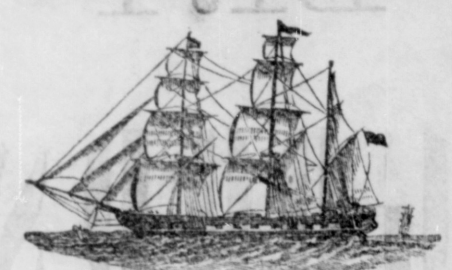
