CONTRACT BRIDGE

The bidding:

Opening lead—two of hearts.
 There are certain routine steps a declarer should take before he plays the first card from dummy.
 If he is playing a notrump contract, he usually starts by counting his winners: If the contract is in a suit, declarer will usually first count his losers. A plan of action is then formed, starting with this as a base.
 Thus, when a heart is led, South can count seven sure winners—two spades, a heart, two diamonds, and two clubs. Two more tricks are needed to make the contract, and the only possible source for them lies in the diamond suit.
 Having gotten this far, the next step to consider is the

method of play that has the greatest chance of developing four diamond tricks. This proposition is more difficult than might first appear.
 Suppose, for example, the usual procedure of leading a diamond to the ace is followed, the intention being to finesse the jack on the return. This method fails in the present case because the queen appears prematurely and only three diamond tricks are won.
 What declarer should also do, in addition to planning a finesse, is give consideration to the various numerical ways the diamond suit can be distributed. These are 5-0, 4-1, and 3-2.
 The contract cannot be made if the diamonds are divided 5-0. This case is therefore dismissed from consideration.
 If the suit is divided 3-2, it does not matter whether a diamond is led to the ace and followed by a finesse, or whether dummy is entered with a club to take a first round finesse. The contract will stand or fall, depending on which opponent has the queen.
 But where the suit is divided 4-1, it is important that a low diamond lead come from dummy, just in case East has the singleton queen. The entire suit can be picked up if this possibility matures. If West has the singleton queen, the contract is hopeless.
 Therefore, upon winning the heart, South leads a club to the ace, plays a low diamond, wins the king, cashes the jack, and takes a proven finesse against the ten.

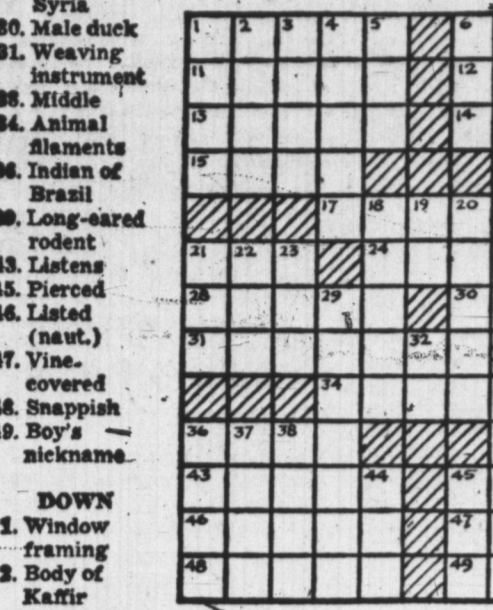

New Talks Assured On Arms Curb Move

 UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) The 82-member United Nations disarmament commission Thursday endorsed by a fast all-yes vote a proposal by the great powers for new talks on arms curbs by a 10-nation committee, including Canada.
 The unanimous action by the big commission—coming only about three hours after it was convened—came as a surprise as it was expected that debate would continue a day or so on the proposal put forward by the United States, Russia, Britain and France.
 Speaking for Canada, UN Ambassador Charles S. A. Ritchie noted that Canada has been associated with disarmament negotiations for some years now. He considered the unanimity shown by the commission members a hopeful sign that a useful first step could be made in actual disarmament.
 Britain's Sir Pierson Dixon spoke of the new committee—comprising the U.S., Russia, Britain, France, Bulgaria, Canada, Czechoslovakia, Italy, Poland and Romania—as a "spade-work" body with the duty of reporting progress to the main UN disarmament commission.
 Russian Ambassador Arkady Sobolev and U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge also were among speakers giving their support to the UN resolution which originated with a proposal from the big powers and was sponsored Thursday by a seven-nation group of lesser powers.
 The resolution's smooth sailing at the full-dress UN meeting followed intense diplomatic activity behind the scenes that sidetracked a small-nation attack on the approach suggested by the big four.
 Thursday's session of the full commission was the first it has held in two years.

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
