

New Type Gold Certificate Used

TORONTO (CP)—The Bank of Nova Scotia Wednesday announced introduction of a new type of gold certificate to facilitate trading in gold. The certificate will be for fine gold to be delivered in the form of bars in London and Toronto. The bank said Samuel Montagu and Co. Ltd., bullion merchants of London, England, will issue certificates for London delivery while the bank will issue those for Toronto delivery. The certificates may be inter-

changed, in which case an adjustment will be made for any difference existing in the relative price of gold on the two markets. Ownership of the certificates may also be transferred. Last year the bank introduced a transferable gold certificate for gold held in their vaults. Owners of the previous issue of the Bank of Nova Scotia certificates now may exchange these for the new interchangeable certificate.

Former Member Dies In Hospital

KINCARDINE, Ont. (CP)—Col. Hugh Clark, former Conservative member of Parliament and Ontario legislature, died Wednesday in hospital. He was 92.

He was a newspaper man in Ontario and the west most of his life and was editor of the Ottawa Citizen in 1897-98.

His political career began in 1902 when he was elected to the Ontario legislature as Conservative member for Centre Bruce. In 1911 he entered federal politics and was elected to Parliament for North Bruce, a seat he retained until 1921.

As a journalist he worked for various Ontario papers, owned and edited two of them and continued to write a weekly column for the High River, Alta., Times,

published by a nephew, until his death.

He was appointed parliamentary undersecretary of state for external affairs in 1916 and late in the war also became parliamentary secretary for militia and defence, a post he retained until 1921. He lost his seat in the 1921 general election, ending his political career.

U.S. May Get Summit Meet

GENEVA (AP)—San Francisco appeared Wednesday to have an inside track for a summit meeting. And the opening date for the meeting of heads of government being mentioned by officials here is Saturday or Monday, Aug. 1 or 3.

San Francisco heads the list of sites prepared by the big four diplomats here for the foreign ministers' conference. Geneva is second, Vienna and Quebec City seemed to be slowly dropping out.

The foreign ministers will have to agree on the time, place and work schedule for a summit meeting, provided one is held. A summit conference still hinges on a reasonable promise of some success as shown by the progress of the foreign ministers' talks.

House Suspends Demurrage Right

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal cabinet has suspended the right won by railways after a court battle—to collect penalty demurrage charges for delays in unloading boxcars at Western grain terminals.

A cabinet order—in council, dated May 7, in effect took from the railways the victory won in a

decision of the Supreme Court of Canada allowing them to collect demurrage. The order said further consideration will be given to the charges. The government move was disclosed Wednesday with publication of an order by the board of transport commissioners implementing the decision, effective Tuesday.

Halifax Man Gets 2 Years

MONTREAL (CP)—Bruce Kenny, 23, a laborer from Halifax, Wednesday was sentenced to two years in penitentiary for stealing a tape-recording machine worth \$229 from West-end St. Mary's Hospital.

Judge M. A. Blain said Kenny's record showed 10 previous convictions for various crimes in the Maritimes, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Montreal. The latest was a jail sentence imposed here last June for auto theft.

Police said Kenny entered the hospital through a partly-opened window and was caught by officials with the machine in his hands.

West German Course Unusual

GENEVA (AP) West Germany's foreign minister is steering an unusual course through the complicated byways of Geneva's diplomatic traffic.

Dr. Heinrich von Brentano has a self-imposed piloting problem—how to avoid colliding with East Germany's foreign minister, Dr.

Lothar Bolz. In a city the size of Geneva—with numerous narrow streets and other hazards—this is no easy task. The route is tricky and full of dangerous curves.

So far the two ministers of a pair of governments that don't recognize each other haven't even scraped fenders. In addition to avoiding Bolz, von Brentano also has the distinction of being a foreign minister at a foreign ministers' conference that he doesn't attend.

This is a unique situation—even for such a meeting as this, which bears a strong resemblance so far to a carpenters' conference.

CARPENTERS LEADING
Up to now, the carpenters have achieved far greater results than the foreign ministers. At least they built a round table to replace the square one at which the Russians didn't want to sit.

Von Brentano's reason for steering clear of the conference is simple: the West Germans say his attendance at a session with Bolz would imply some sort of recognition of the East German Communist regime.

So, von Brentano imported still another doctor—Dr. Wilhelm Crow, West Germany's ambassador to Washington—to head his group in the close range work.

To prevent any German collisions in the conference room, and

perhaps for some other reasons, the United Nations hosts to the conference have acted with resolution.

They bolted both German tables to the floor.

Pulp Industry Faces Threat

OTTAWA (CP)—Development of methods to make pulp from hardwoods poses a serious threat to future exports by the Canadian pulp and paper industry, the Commons mining committee was told Wednesday.

The statement was made by the Forest Industry Associations of British Columbia in a brief urging increased federal participation in all fields of forestry research.

One recommendation was for the development of quick-growing strains of trees to give the pulp and paper industry a cheap and continuing source of raw material.

The brief said that pulp and paper is manufactured in Canada from softwoods. However the importance of this source of fibre for pulp, textiles or chemicals was declining due to technological advances.

Within the last few years it had become possible to make pulp from hardwoods of a type which can be grown in warmer

latitudes. This had greatly expanded the forest potential of such regions, especially in the eastern United States.

"It must be expected that similar technological progress will ultimately make possible the use of enormous tropical hardwood forests," the brief said.

Great Gains Have Been Made But Tuberculosis Has Not Been Conquered

Districts located in the shaded portion of the Map of Prince Edward Island, seen above, have been surveyed by the Tuberculosis and X-Ray Survey during the past 2 1/2 years; districts located in the unshaded area will be surveyed during 1959.

This Survey is a joint project of the Provincial Health Department and the P. E. I. Tuberculosis League.

47,683 persons have been tested and 21 cases requiring treatment were discovered through the surveys; through all methods of case finding some 50 new cases are discovered annually.

Ascertain your standing by attending the Mass Tuberculin and X-Ray Clinic when your district is surveyed.

The older age group are more apt to develop active tuberculosis. Nowadays many over the age of 80 are being treated in Sanatoria.

The success of the Survey will largely depend on the cooperation and enthusiasm of the voluntary workers in each district.

During May and June people in and around the following centres will have the opportunity of attending the Tuberculin and X-Ray Survey;

Southport, Central, East, West Royalty, St. Peters North, Pownal, Mermald.

Further notice regarding Clinics for July to November will be announced later.
