The police of Skibbereen, Ireland, are considerably flustered over the arrival there of a son of O'Donovan Rossa, the New York apostle of dynamite. His footsteps are dogged by the police at every turn, but nothing yet has appeared to cause his arrest.

BEN. BETLER arrived in Washington on the 15th inst. He positively declines to be interviewed by "a damned infernal reporter," as to his political attitude or future policy, but said when asked given the subject proper consideration he would declare himself over his own signature in unmistakable terms.

It is reported that a sailing vessel arrived at Miramichi, N. B., direct from Marselles with a perfect quarantine. Much uneasiness is felt over the circumstance, as the vessel is from the heart of the cholera district, and it is felt that steps should be immediately taken by the government to prevent any chance of the disease visiting Canadian seaports.

TWELVE United States fishermen, from the Gloucester fishing schooner, Abbie Morris, were rescued forty miles east of St. Pierre Island on the 17th inst. They were blown away from the vessel and were without food or water or rest four days and nights, and were nearly dead through exhaustion. The vessel, with the captain and cook on board, drifted out to sea.

The Brigantine Columbia, 341 tons, Capt. James Mustard, which left the wharf near Carigan Bridge on the 18th of June, arrived at Queenstown on Tuesday, the 1st July making the passage in the shortest space of 13 days—a passage unprecedented this season. This vessel is owned by James E. Macdonald, Esq., of Carigan Bridge, and Capt. Mustard. She was loaded with oats by Owen Connolly, Esq., and her cargo arrived in good order.

PETITODIAC, N. B., has a scandal with the scene laid in Charlottetown. Here it is: On the 8th inst. Mrs. Lane, the wife of a highly respectable farmer of Petitodiac, arrived in this city. She was accompanied by a schoolmaster named Charles Pearson. They registered at the Rockin, remained over night, and in the morning left for Vernon River, where Mrs. Lane visited some friends, and remained until yesterday. The husband of Mrs. Lane, a tall, able, well built, middle-aged man, arrived here on Thursday night in search of his wife and the fellow Pearson. He secured the services of Policeman Cameron and a constable. They searched the city for Pearson but he could not be found. They discovered, however, that he was at Vernon River with Mrs. Lane. Lane was so enraged at his wife's unfaithfulness that the officers did not think it advisable for him and Pearson to meet. The services of Deputy Sheriff Curtis were obtained, and a writ was issued against Pearson. The Sheriff went to Vernon River yesterday, arrested him, and he now lies safely in Queen's County Jail awaiting results. Lane states that Pearson boarded with him at Petitodiac, and that he was suspicious of improper intimacy between Pearson and his wife for some time. The fact that Pearson secretly came to the Island with Mrs. Lane to spend his holidays, strengthened his suspicions, and Lane now sues for \$500 damages. Mrs. Lane arrived in the city yesterday and left for home with her husband this morning. She is a woman of fifty years and the mother of a large family.
