Three-year-old John William Creed, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Creed of Sturgeon, passed away yesterday morning in the King's County Hospital at Montague from injuries received when he ran in front of a grain binder at his home.

On Tuesday afternoon while the men were in the field cutting grain, young Johnny slipped quietly into the field and made his way in front of the binder. Before he was seen the blade had struck the little boy on the legs and mangled them severely. He was immediately taken to the King's County Hospital for treatment, where he was carefully attended. However, he passed away in the early hours of yesterday morning.

Besides his sorrowing parents, he leaves to mourn a younger brother Barry, and a younger sister, Sylvia Jean.

The funeral service will be held on Saturday from St. Paul's Church, Sturgeon.
