## Of Special Interest to our Farmers

### Ringling Hogs.

An experienced breeder of hogs writes: Remove the rings from your hogs noses, turn them into the field or fields that will be needed for plowing before any other and encourage them to root, as they will pay you big for this luxury by destroying the larva of insects, etc. Since the days of ringling hogs, the various insects have become one of the greatest pests of the farmer. Unfortunately, indeed, is the man who has no hogs to root up his fields destroying the larva of insects preparatory to ploughing and seeding. Every man who places rings in his hogs noses invites cholera. Alternate the pigs from one field to another same as you alternate your crops, never failing to have one field at least, at liberty for the hogs to work upon. Now don't say you can't afford it. You might as well say that you cannot afford to allow robins and other insectivorous birds on your premises. There was a time when the farmers slew these birds supposing them to be his enemies; but of late he sees his mistake and accepts them as his friends. When he treats his swine as I advise he will realize his great mistake in ringling them.

### Care of Swine in Summer.

No other stock on the farm are so abused as are the swine. Considered as mere manure machines their treatment is all right, but as live stock their treatment as usually seen on a Canadian farm is far from a credit to an intelligent owner. From the point of view of health the only reason that hogs have succeeded in perpetuating an existence is that they are slaughtered at an early age, and before their maltreatment gets in its damaging result.

Pure air and cleanliness are essential to health with all our domestic animals. A run at pasture should be provided in summer, if practicable, for all swine of whatever age. This gives pure air, clean surroundings and the needed exercise. Earth is the best of all disinfectants. The best growth we have ever been able to secure with young pigs has been when they have run at large on the ground at pleasure while sucking the sow. After weaning also the same thrift is kept up under like liberty. In all cases greater growth is secured with the given quantity of food. Breeding sows should always have a ground run in summer. Turned to pasture they will scarcely need any other feed than water the pasture supplies, while their pigs will be farrowed strong and hearty.

Nothing need be lost in the manure problem from summering hogs on the ground. By hurdling hogs on the land desired to be enriched no manure is lost. It is there when wanted and the hogs spread it without cost. Clover pasturing of hogs is widely practiced in the West. In this Province hogs are recommended for the orchard, and the practice is as desirable for the hogs as advantageous to the orchard.

### Fruit Trees.

The bones of fish and fowls and the larger small pieces of bones which are bought with beefsteak and mutton constitute the very best food for fruit trees and grapevines if the fragments are only placed where the roots can lay hold of them. Instead of being cast into

the back yard as food for strayed dogs and cats, care should be taken to deposit everything of the sort in a small tub with a cover. As soon as a few pounds have accumulated, take the tub to some grapevine or fruit tree, dig a hole three or four feet long, a foot or two deep, dump in the bones, and fill in the soil. The more fragments that can be spread around the better; but they should be buried so deep that a plow or spade could not reach them. The roots of growing vines or fruit trees will soon find this mine of fertility, and will feed on the elements that will greatly promote the growth of healthy wood and the development of fair and luscious fruit when cast out of the kitchen door. Bones are a nuisance but if properly used, they become a source of valuable fertility. Let every person who owns a grapevine or fruit tree save all the bones that pass through the kitchen and bury them where they will be turned to some profit.—Ira Graber, in Country Gentleman.
