AFTER THE MOTHERS.—Some scoffers, provoked by the paternal nature of curfew legislation in Kotoua, Indiana, proposed the following clause, with the unexpected result that it was accepted in earnest and passed into law: "It is further provided that when a child comes home at the prescribed hour and finds its mother not present to hear its prayers and put it to bed, it shall report such dereliction to the mayor of the city, whose duty it shall be to search for the absent mother until found, and if it should be shown that the mother was not on an errand of necessity or mercy it shall be the duty of the mayor to administer a reprimand to said mother."

ISLANDERS KILLED.—The Guardian reports that Mr. Oliver Smith met with a sad end at Berkeley, Col., on the 1st inst. Mr. Smith had been employed in the electrical works building at Berkeley, and in some unaccountable way, probably while examining water pipes, fell down the elevator shaft. His neck was broken and his body crushed by the fall. Mr. Smith belonged to Hampton, in this Province, and was 38 years of age. He was highly esteemed in his new home.

Mr. G. Clark, son of Mr. W. S. Clark, of Alma, was accidentally killed in his woodworking factory in Whitman, Mass. The sad accident occurred on Thursday 9th March. While trying to put a belt on an overhead shaft running at a high rate of speed his coat sleeve caught in a screw and he was carried over the shaft and his life crushed out. Mr. Clark leaves a wife and one child to mourn. His death is deeply regretted by all who enjoyed his acquaintance.
