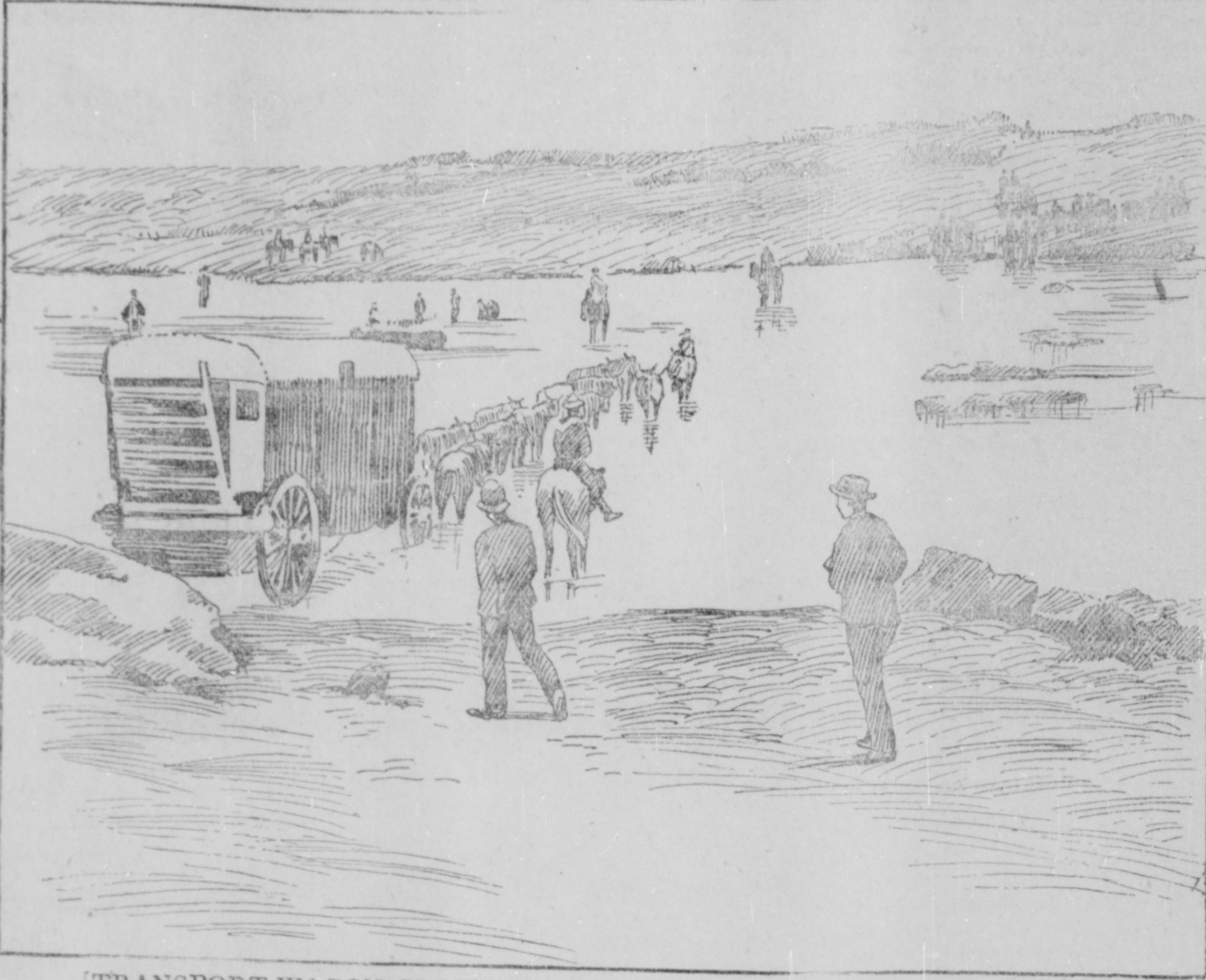

**WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.**

Interesting Particulars of the Struggle Between Great Britain and the Boers.

**THE QUEEN ACTIVE.**

Queen Victoria brought her visit to London to a close on the 10th, and returned to Windsor, after an inspection of two battalions of the Guards. Throughout the day vast crowds gathered outside Buckingham Palace and along the advertised routes to the railroad station, and when the royal carriage started for Hyde Park on its way to Paddington, the enthusiasm broke out in a roar of cheers which was heard a mile away almost unbroken until the train departed. Previous to leaving the place there was a brief but interesting ceremony on the grounds, where 2,000 khaki-clad Guardsmen in full marching order were drawn up for the final inspection of Her Majesty before their departure for South Africa. Queen's weather enlivened the scene with bright sunshine, and the temperature was as mild as May. The Queen, accompanied by the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of York, Prince and Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, and Princess Beatrice, drove slowly along the yellow line, and to the Duke of Cambridge who was present as honorary colonel of the Grenadier Guards, Her Majesty expressed admiration for the splendid appearance of the men. After the inspection cheers for the queen were called for and enthusiastic hurrahs rent the air, the soldiers waving their helmets on the points of their bayonets. The general public was excluded, but the Queen specially invited the wives and children of officers now in South Africa to be present.

**SENTIMENT IN ENGLAND**

If there are few cranks in England who are always on the wrong side, if, moreover, there are a certain number of wild Irishmen who rejoice in anything that gives pain and grief to Englishmen—who condemn the present war of England, in behalf of the rights of her people in the Transvaal, at least the general sentiment of the community is as whole—and sound as could be. In Parliament and out of Parliament reasonable Englishmen are of one mind. The whole heart of England beats in harmony. A Pro-Boer candidate for the House of Commons is a thing almost unknown. Even an opposition candidate is rejected lest he

should embarrass the Government. This is most gratifying, and augurs the best for the future of the Empire. Every Mail brings us additional testimony to this fact and now the news of victory upon victory will add joy and thankfulness to resolve.

**KRUGER'S VIEW.**

The Pietermaritzburg correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, in a despatch dated Thursday, March 8, says: "Evidence of the importance attached by Pretoria to the prolongation of the siege of Ladysmith is afforded by a letter found in a deserted Boer camp, addressed by President Kruger to the Landrosts of the various districts and dated January 18, com-

plaining that in some of the districts only half of the Burghers were at the front and that others were staying at their homes, and urging measures to remedy this state of things, since the war means a life and death struggle to our national existence. President Kruger went on to say: "The condition of Ladysmith is critical. If we do our best and vanquish the enemy, we shall get all we desire."

Much comment has been caused in militia circles by the announcement that Lieut.-Col. White, who was promoted to be D.O.C. of the Montreal district on the appointment of Col. Gordon for service in South Africa, has been suddenly ordered back to his

old district at Quebec, and been replaced by Lieut.-Colonel Roy. In the meantime, the district is in charge of the senior officer, Lieut.-Col. Cole, who will welcome the Strathcona Horse to Montreal. It was Col. White who, as D.O.C., ordered out the militia last week to protect the drill-hall against the mob.

The Queen has authorized the wearing of the snamrock in her Irish Soldiers' helmets on St. Patrick's Day.

An elderly Russian Jew named Benjamin Silpent, who is alleged to be a naturalized American citizen, has been sentenced at Kimberley to three years imprisonment at hard labor for signalling to the Boers from a house-top during the siege. His plea of insanity was rejected.

A despatch to the War Office from Ladysmith, says General Buller requests the publication of the acknowledgement of his gratitude for the congratulatory messages which are pouring in from India, the colonies, and towns, and from British Association in all parts of the world.

Edinburgh students have with violence broken up a pro-Boer meeting in their city. Bordeaux students, to show their Krugrophile sympathies, have battered the office of the British consul. There are two new moons in March this year. Perhaps this unusual celestial occurrence, coupled with the terrestrial disturbances in Africa, has been too much for the students heads.
