Cabinet Discusses '67 Youth Parliament

The question of a Youth Parliament for 1967, the brainchild of a young member of the Centennial Commission, Bill Fair of Saskatoon, Sask., was discussed yesterday at a meeting of the provincial cabinet, Premier Walter Shaw said last night.

Mr. Fair has spent nearly two weeks here in an effort to gain island support for the project, which would have 265 young Canadians representing every constituency in the country sitting in the House of Parliament during the summer recess of National Centennial Year.

Aim of the project is to give

Canadians a better idea of how their government operates, and would claim a larger scope than the specific Parliament sitting.

Several provincial governments have already endorsed the program, according to Mr. Fair.

"In principle this would be a good thing," said the premier last night. "The matter of education is certainly worthwhile."

"The project would require a good deal of preparation on the part of the provincial governments to get the proper young people working and participating in it."

"The provincial government has no objections to the project, and when the details are available we will discuss it more fully."

Also discussed at the meeting was the matter of the Atlantic Development Board's grant to Prince Edward Island for road-building.

GEORGETOWN — At a meeting of the Resources Development Group held on Wednesday in St. David's United Church Hall, it was disclosed by Reid Sangster, Director of Resources and Development that Georgetown has been selected as the area in Kings County at which a meeting will be held on Oct. 1, to discuss and test study materials and projects for fall and winter study at development group meetings.

Members of the group were encouraged to settle in Georgetown.

The Mayor stated that the functions of the Town Council and those of the Development Group must be separate in their application but felt that a great deal could be accomplished by cooperation between the council and the group.

It was suggested that the Mayor and Council or a representative of civic government attend all group meetings, to

It is hoped to hold a meeting of the group in the near future, with representatives of Industry, Town Planning, Department of Industry, Central Mortgage and Housing in attendance.

In this way it is felt that a great deal could be accomplished in an interchange of ideas and basic problems. A vote of thanks was extended the Mayor and Council and also to Mr. Sangster and to Mr. MacDonnell for their attendance.

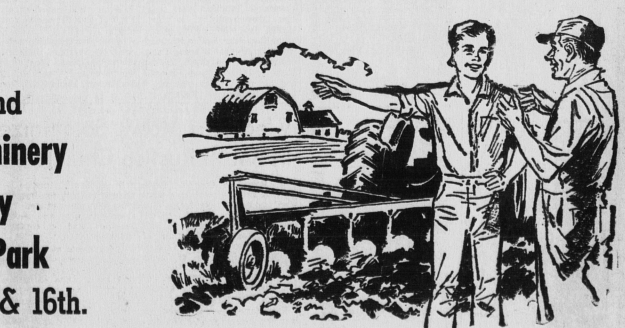
