MR. HUBERT S. STRICKLAND

The death occurred at the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Tuesday, Oct. 14th, 1952, of a highly respected and beloved citizen in the person of Hubert Stanley Strickland in his 73rd year after a seven week's illness.

Born at Lockport, N. S., the son of Thomas Strickland and Sarah Jane Blomfield, he moved to Charlottetown in an early age and was an employee of the Canadian National Railway for 38 years, retiring July 22nd, 1945.

On April 12th, 1946, he was awarded the Imperial Services Medal in recognition of the meritorious service he had rendered.

Throughout his lifetime he took a keen interest in everything for the betterment of the community, with a kind and sympathetic understanding for the welfare of others.

His funeral was very largely attended by those to whom he had endeared himself, from every walk of life, and the many beautiful floral tributes from far and near were silent testimony of the esteem in which he was held.

Increase Shown In Fishery Figures

An excess of over 4 million pounds in the fish catch for the first nine months of this year over a similar period in 1951 is noted in figures released by the Federal Department of Fisheries. This year there was a total of 32,315,900 pounds valued at \$2,325,262 while in the same period last year there were 27,461,900 pounds valued at \$2,026,643.

Lobsters led the list of sea products caught, 8,301,500 lbs. having been landed this year with a value of \$1,829,981, compared to 8,225,100 lbs. landed in 1951 with a value of \$1,686,476.

Fishers won an almost 100 per cent increase in the landing of hake. The figures are 4,426,300 lbs. with a value of \$84,055 compared to 23,319 lbs. with a value of \$37,745 for the same period of 1951.

The herring catch was roughly about 60 per cent of that of the previous year. The 1952 landings were 4,261,900 lbs., with a value of \$41,391 compared to 6,254,700 lbs. with a value of \$66,732 in 1951.

Landings of cod were down three-quarters of a million pounds. 3,157,200 lbs. with a value of \$88,954, were landed up to September 30th this year compared to 3,924,800 lbs., with a value of \$89,543, landed during the first nine months of 1951.

Haddock showed an increase, 67,000 probably to the operations of the new druggers which are now fishing out of Souris. For the first nine months of this year, 719,200 lbs., with a value of \$34,607, were landed compared to 84,600 lbs., with a value of \$3,947, for the corresponding period last year.

Amounts and values of other fish landed—with the 1951 figures in brackets are as follows: Winter flounders, 11,000 lbs. (26,900) valued at \$220 (\$429); mackerel, 563,800 lbs. (1,236,700) valued at \$16,089 (\$3,655); smelts, 140,700 lbs. (399,600) valued at \$18,442 (\$39,198); bar clams, 597,700 lbs. (78,100) valued at \$14,211 (\$1,198); soft shell clams, 1,015,100 lbs. (354,500) valued at \$37,968 (\$7,270); quahaugs, 1,371,900 lbs. (238,600) valued at \$40,975 (\$8,177); oysters, 1,157,200 lbs. (302,700) valued at \$11,505 (\$14,493); scallops, 3,600 lbs. (6,500) valued at \$1,644 (\$2,600); and Irish moss, 6,551,700 lbs. (3,902,500) valued at \$81,250 (\$40,205).

OTTAWA, Oct. 21 (CP)—Two employees of a Hollywood, Calif. firm today were fined \$100 and costs each for conducting a lottery. The \$223 collected in a baby show staged here for the Canadian Legion was ordered seized.

The lottery charge against Mrs. Helen Boyd, 33, and her husband, 40-year-old Gene Boyd of Hollywood, arose out of sale of tickets of chance on a \$100 Canada savings bond in connection with the baby show.

The court was told that in addition to the \$223 found in Boyd's hotel room, an additional \$1,000 in baby show receipts had been deposited in a bank by them.

Robb Associates Company of Hollywood operated the month-long show on behalf of the Montgomery branch of the Canadian Legion. The show wound up with a coronation pageant last Saturday night at which baby winners were crowned and the winner of a \$100 savings bond door prize was announced.
