123rd Anniversary Services Held At Alberton United Church Yesterday

The 123rd anniversary services in Alberton United Church yesterday were conducted by the minister, Rev. Murray Gardner who also read a brief historical sketch of the congregation. Rev. W. S. Godfrey, D. D. superintendent of home missions for the Maritime Conference and a former Minister of the congregation, was guest preacher in the morning. Choosing as his text, "He Shall Have Dominion from Sea to Sea" (Ps. 72:3). Rev. Dr. Godfrey said that if Canada is to become a Christian nation she must be Christianized by the church. He laid upon his hearers their great responsibility as members of the Christian Church to do their share in answering the prayer we often sing, "Lord of the Lands, Make Canada Thine Own." Speaking of the United Church of Canada he said that although she now has more churches than all the banks in Canada have local branches, or than all the railroads in Canada have local stations, yet there is need for many more. To places where new centres of population are springing up the church must go with her people. Old and new Canadians must find satisfaction for the needs of their souls in the Christian Church and they will seek it in Communism and other dangerous isms of our day. He called for rededication to Christ and the Church. The mixed choir sang the anthem, "Onward, Christian Soldiers." During the service Rev. Dr. Godfrey administered the sacrament of baptism to Joyce Alberta, infant daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Murray Gardner. It is of interest that little Joyce Gardner is the first child of a resident United Church minister to be born in Alberton, and that she is the first infant to reside in the Alberton parsonage since Dr. Godfrey's own daughter was born thirty-one years ago. Rev. Alex. MacDowell, minister of the Montrose-Elmsdale pastoral charge was guest preacher at the evening service. Referring to the congregation's anniversary, he stressed the fact that although its founders lived under rigorous pioneer conditions, yet they considered a church and the public worship of God of utmost importance. After reading Hebrews 10:23-27 he based his sermon on "not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together." The church, he
