

Dodgers Lose To Giants Yanks Win; Red Sox Lose

BROOKLYN (AP) — Bobby Thomson, the old Dodger killer, tripled twice and drove in three runs for New York Giants Tuesday night as young Curt Barley gained his first major league shut out with a fivehitter that beat Brooklyn 5-0.

The 25-year-old rookie right hander, gaining a 57 record, had to go some to blank the Brooklyn with troublesome first and ninth innings.

In the first a single by Jimmy Gilliam, a double by Gino Cimoli and a walk loaded the bases for the Dodgers with none out. But the kid got tough and fanned Gil Hodges — the National League record holder for grand slam home runs — then got Carl Furillo on an infield pop. Roy Campanella hit into a force out to end the frame.

In the ninth, Hodges led off and reached second on a bad throw by shortstop Ed Bressoud. But Barley stuck with it to get Fur

illo on a foul pop. Campanella on an infield pop and then send a called third strike past Randy Jackson.

CHICAGO (AP) — Kansas City Athletics presented newly appointed manager Harry Craft with a 32 victory over Chicago White Sox Tuesday to snap a seven game losing streak.

Craft was named manager of the A's earlier Tuesday after Lou Boudreau had been fired. Boudreau watched the first six innings of the contest from a box behind the Kansas City dugout and then left the park.

Home runs by Woody Held and Billy Martin plus a sacrifice fly helped provide the A's with all their runs and southpaw Alex Kellner with his fifth victory against four losses.

BALTIMORE (AP) — Ray Moore and Kenny Lehman held the rampaging Boston Red Sox to just five hits Tuesday night while Willy Miranda provided the big

stick for a 2-1 Baltimore victory before a crowd of 19,851.

The victory, Baltimore's fifth straight, put the Orioles in fifth place.

Miranda, the normally weak-hitting Oriole shortstop, had the batting formula, getting two singles in three trips to the plate and driving in both of Baltimore's runs.

DETROIT (AP) — Cleveland Indians out loose with three home runs off righthander Jim Bunning and whipped Detroit Tigers 5-1 Tuesday night behind the eight-hit pitching of Don Mossi. The loss dropped the Tigers into sixth place in the American League.

Roger Maris, Gene Woodling and ex-Tiger Vic Wertz crashed roundtrippers that sent Bunning down to his fourth defeat against 13 triumphs.

NEW YORK (AP) — Big Bob Turley four - hit Washington for his fourth shutout of the season

The American League leading New York Yankees socked the Senators 4-0. Rookie Tony Kubek had three singles in the Yanks' hit attack.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Ronnie Kline of Pittsburgh won his first game since July 9 by whipping Philadelphia Phillies 5-3 Tuesday night on five hits.

The victory also snapped an eight-game losing streak for the Pirates and a seven-year-old ringer for the 25-year-old right hander.

MILWAUKEE (AP) — South paw Warren Spahn survived a two - run ninth inning Tuesday night as Milwaukee Braves defeated Cincinnati, 5-4, posting their ninth victory in 11 games with the Redlegs this season.

Spahn who allowed nine hits, including home runs in the fourth and eighth innings, took his 11th victory against eight losses this season.

MONTREAL (CP) — Defending champion Marlene Stewart Street, all four American challengers and 11 from Canada came successfully through the first round Tuesday in the Canadian Ladies' open amateur golf championship.

Marlene had the easiest win, an 8 and 7 victory over Mrs. R. D. Bagley of Winnipeg. In the rest of the field toiling along in match play there was only a tinge of an upset in one or two matches.

The four American winners were Mrs. Maurice Glick of Baltimore, Md.; Marjorie Burns of Greensboro, N.C.; Mrs. Norman Woolworth of New Canaan, Conn.; and Mrs. C. F. Spalding of Greenwich, Conn.

The closest match, the only extra-hole affair of the day, went

to Mary Ellen Driscoll of Saint John, N.B., over Mona Morup of Calgary. The two juniors who earned their way into the championship flight of 35 battled along all the way and Mary Ellen won at the 19th a 48-yarder, with a par five.

Mrs. Glick, rated by many to be the top American challenger, had no great difficulty in disposing of Teddy Berube of Montreal 4 and 3 despite the fact that she was never better than par in the 15 holes played. She held a four-up lead at the turn.

Marlene won the sixth with a birdie and took the seventh with a par. At the eighth they halved the only hole of the match and Marlene won the ninth with a birdie four. She took the short 10th hole with a birdie three and closed out the match at the 11th with a birdie four.

Sees Pro Soccer Leagues Here In Five Years

WINNIPEG (CP)—Canada will have professional soccer leagues within five years, the secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Soccer Football Association said Tuesday.

George Anderson of Winnipeg said in an interview two leagues should be operating within that time at Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver, with two teams each—and at Edmonton, Calgary, Winnipeg, Hamilton and Ottawa, with one apiece.

Two-team cities would be assured of one home game each week.

Anderson said: "We'll have to go into professional soccer within five years because all our teams are amateur and players have to get off work to participate in exhibition games against touring sides. A professional league will not only surmount this problem but will raise the standard of play and the interest of younger players who then can see a future in the game."

At present, Canada has only 12 registered professional players, but more than 8,300 amateurs. All the professionals play in Montreal.

Anderson said the association is planning to televise Canadian soccer championship games in the next year or so.

Anderson said victories against touring sides this year and Canada's entry into world cup play has given this country a higher rating in world soccer.

Cobey McCluskey Beaten By Rodriguez In Sixth Round

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Herbie Rodriguez of New Orleans floored Cobey McCluskey four times Monday night and stopped the light-hitting Canadian in one minute, eight seconds of the sixth round.

Rodriguez weighed 153, McCluskey 152.

Rodriguez sent the 27-year-old native of Halifax to the canvas twice in the fourth round and had him down twice in the sixth round before referee Pete Giarrusso called a halt.

McCluskey was the target of a two-hand barrage and slumped to his knees while hanging on the ropes when Giarrusso stepped in.

The fast-moving Canadian started off well in the first round and earned an edge by using a straight left to the head and an occasional shot to the midsection. Rodriguez unlimbered his heavy artillery in the second and scored with righthand smashes to the head.

McCluskey going left to the chin sent Rodriguez down for an eight count in the fourth and seconds later a right had him down for another eight count.

McCluskey stayed clear in the fifth round, but the two righthand smashes ended things in the sixth.

The victory was the 22nd for Rodriguez in 23 professional fights and his 17th knockout. The loss was McCluskey's 12th against 69 victories.

A crowd of 993 turned out with the gate totalling \$1,720.

Army Athletes Will Compete

CAMP BORDEN, Ont. (CP) — More than 200 of the army's top track and field athletes will compete in the first two-day annual Canadian Army track and field championships starting Wednesday.

Events include 100, 220 440 and 800 - yard dashes, one, three and six-mile runs, hammer throw, pole vault, high jump, broad jump, hop step - and - jump, 16-pound shot put, javelin, discus, 440-yard relays and tug-of-war.

The meet is the result of eliminations held in unit, area and command meets. The 12 best soldier athletes from across Canada who have recorded the best times or performances in each individual event will compete. The six army unit teams achieving the best times in relay competition will also compete, and will the winning command tug-of-war teams.

Kansas City Athletics Fire Their Manager Lou Boudreau

CHICAGO (AP)—Lou Boudreau, an American League manager every year except one since 1942, was fired Tuesday by Kansas City Athletics and was replaced by one of his coaches, Harry Craft.

It is up to the 40-year-old Boudreau to determine whether he wants to be "kicked upstairs" by the club he managed since the Athletics' franchise was shifted from Philadelphia to Kansas City for the 1955 season.

This city is becoming a graveyard of big league managers. Bobby Bragan of Pittsburgh Pirates was fired here Saturday.

Boudreau's release came in a 49 - word prepared announcement by Arnold Johnson, Athletics president. It said: "As of today's game, Harry Craft is manager of the Kansas City Athletics for the balance of the season."

"Lou Boudreau has been offered certain responsibilities and duties in the Athletics' front office."

HOPE FOR IMPROVEMENT

"We are disappointed in the showing of the club this year, and are hopeful of improvement."

Boudreau managed Cleveland Indians from 1942 through 1950 and Boston Red Sox in 1952-53-54.

Craft, 42, former outfield star for Cincinnati Redlegs, managed Kansas City Blues of the American Association in 1953 and 1954, before he joined the Athletics.

Boudreau, whose Red Sox contract was picked up by Kansas City at a reported \$40,000 a year, originally was signed by Kansas City for two years. That contract was extended through 1956 midway in the 1956 season. So whether Lou is paid off for the remainder of this year and next season depends on whether he remains with the club. The only year Boudreau did not manage an American League club since 1942 was in 1951 when he joined the Red Sox as a player.

Dodger Stadium Report Given

NEW YORK (AP) — An engineer's report on a proposed over-all rehabilitation of a 110-block area in downtown Brooklyn to include a site for a Dodger baseball stadium said Tuesday it would cost more than \$20,000,000 for a stadium and about \$52,000,000 to rehabilitate the entire area.

The report to a special mayors committee contained no recommendations but "observations," according to deputy mayor John E.J. Theobald, who heads the Mayor's special five-man committee to study the downtown Brooklyn area.

Breaks 4-Minute Mile In Sweden

MALMÖE, Sweden (Reuters)—Dan Waern of Sweden broke the four-minute-mile barrier Tuesday for the second time in less than three weeks when he clocked 3:59.7. He ran the mile in 3:59.3 July 19.

Waern's performance was the 28th sub-four-minute mile since Britain's Roger Bannister first broke the barrier in May, 1954.

CONFISCATE PROPERTY

TUNIS (AP) — The new republic of Tunisia has confiscated all property belonging to the deposed Bey of Tunis and his family. The holdings are valued at 10,000,000 francs (\$28,500,000). The republics official journal, published Monday for the first time, said the property of Mohamed Lamine, ousted July 25, is confiscated as of that date and will henceforth belong to the state. Also included is the property of the former bey's wife, who was engaged in routine submersed operations when they collapsed.

SUBMARINES COLLIDE

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two United States Atlantic Fleet submarines collided at sea early Tuesday. The vessels were damaged slightly but the crews escaped injury, the navy reported.

The submarines are the Tusk, based at New London, Conn., and the Cobbler, out of Norfolk, Va. The navy said the submarines were engaged in routine submerged operations when they collided.
