International Nickel Report

TORONTO, Aug. 17 (CP)—International Nickel Company of Canada, Ltd., and subsidiaries had net earnings in three months ended June 30 of \$12,056,576, after all charges—depreciation, depletion, taxes, etc., and equivalent, after preferred dividends, to 79 cents a share on the common stock.

It compares with \$8,220,950, or 53 cents a share, in the same quarter of 1949, and with \$8,329,015, or 54 cents a share, in the first quarter of this year.

For the six months ended June 30, net earnings were \$20,385,591, equal to \$1.33 a share, compared with \$20,983,417, or \$1.37 a share, in the first half of 1949.

Crop Outlook Reported Good

OTTAWA, Aug. 17 (CP)—Canada truly promises to be the food stronghold of democracies faced with the threat of total war. With her own yearly wheat needs considered at less than 150,000,000 bushels, the country is expected this year to produce 544,000,000 bushels of wheat—a big bumper crop that would be the third largest in history.

Along with this forecast, the Bureau of Statistics estimated today that Canada this year should produce bigger harvests of oats, barley, rye, flaxseed, potatoes and some forage crops.

Plan Special Set Of Postage Stamps

OTTAWA, Aug. 17 (CP)—A special set of postage stamps will be issued next year to commemorate the centennial of the first Canadian postage stamp in 1851, the Post Office Department announced today. The stamps will be released during the International Philatelic Exhibition in Toronto in September, 1951.

Maritime Provinces Expand Health Services

OTTAWA, Aug. 17—Extension of public health services through training additional personnel and providing the best available equipment is going forward in the Maritime Provinces with the aid of federal health grants Hon. Paul Martin, Minister of National Health and Welfare, reported here.

In Prince Edward Island, for example, new surgical procedures are to be introduced at the Provincial Sanatorium, and the technical equipment for this extension of treatment will be purchased from a national health grant.

To obtain more persons with specialized training to man the growing health services, bursaries have been awarded to 22 persons. Reginald B. Bowser, Halifax, will spend a year at the University of Toronto studying public health engineering, and Dr. W. G. Dawson, Halifax, director of dental health services for Nova Scotia, will take a year's course in public health dentistry at the same university. To improve cancer diagnostic and therapy services in the northeastern part of New Brunswick, a bursary has been awarded to Dr. Francois St. Laurent of St. Charles de Caplan, Que. He will study at the St. Vincent Charity Hospital, Cleveland, Ohio, and on his return next year will join the staff of the Hotel Dieu, Campbellton. Miss Mary L. MacLeod, Pictou, N. S., will enroll at the Maritime School of Social Work, Halifax, for a year's training in psychiatric social work prior to joining either the neuro-psychiatric division of the provincial health department or the staff of the Nova Scotia Hospital. Bursaries have also been awarded to Miss Ellen V. Piers of the provincial health department, Halifax, for a summer course in psychology at Columbia University, New York, and to Dr. Myer Mendelson, Halifax, for post-graduate study in psychiatry at the Allen Memorial Institute, Montreal.

Sixteen of the bursaries go to nurses from Nova Scotia for post-graduate training in public health nursing at Dalhousie University will be Misses Margaret Chute, Rosella Morris, Flora Morrison, Amelia McAuley, S. Anne McIver, Elizabeth West, Constance Eaton and Teresa Brown. Those scheduled to attend the University of Toronto are Misses Elizabeth Cordeau, Georgette Leblanc, Elizabeth Manning, Margaret Meagher, Evelyn MacDonald, Marjorie Swift, Mary Whidden and Lauchena McLellan. New Brunswick has been allotted funds to buy health education materials and to employ a medical student to assist the medical health officer for the Moncton district during the summer months, while in Nova Scotia funds have been allotted to employ two additional people to operate new diagnostic equipment at the Nova Scotia Hospital.

Costs of these projects will be more than \$37,500 in the current fiscal year. Each was recommended to Ottawa by the Minister of Health for the province concerned: Hon. A. W. Matheson for Prince Edward Island; Hon. A. H. McKinnon for Nova Scotia; and Hon. Dr. F. A. McGrand for New Brunswick.

Seeing Eye Dog Is Constant Companion

(In a recently published copy of the News-Herald of Vancouver, B. C. appeared a picture and the following article on Mr. Lee Morrison. This will be of interest to a large number of relatives and friends in Prince Edward Island. Mr. Morrison is a nephew of Mr. Hugh F. Morrison of Summerside and of Mrs. William A. Bernard of French River. He is the son of Mr. William Morrison and Mrs. Nina MacKay Morrison of Vancouver, formerly of Kensington and Malpeque, respectively, who resided in Summerside prior to their departure for Western Canada.)

"This story might be entitled: 'A man's best friend is his dog.' The man in this case is Lee Morrison, the dog's name is Hanley. Lee is in charge of a cigarette stand operated by the Canadian National Institute for the Blind in the main Post Office, Hastings and Granville. Hanley is his seeing-eye dog.
