Docket Is Heavy At Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — A heavy docket was on before Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday.

Deputy Attorney General A. MacGuigan, QC, represented the Crown in all cases.

John Henry Gauthier of Bristol, represented by G. Gordon, and charged with impaired driving, was found guilty and fined \$100 and costs following evidence of seven crown witnesses.

Giving evidence for the Crown were: RCMP Cpl. William A. Wilson, Charlottetown; Sgt. Edward S. Stechy, Charlottetown; Allan Charles Robins, Victoria; William Albert Touzel, Victoria; John Lannon, Victoria; and Raymond Joseph Lewis and John Henry MacInnis, both of St. Peter's.

Stanley Donald Bruce, Heatherton, was fined \$100 and costs for impaired driving.

MISCHIEF CHARGES

Basil Freeman Higginbotham, Murray was fined \$25 and costs after he elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty to a charge of mischief driving, damaging a truck windshield, property of Earl Acorn, Jernigan.

Raymond, elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty to a charge of mischief driving, damage to a car windshield, the property of Byron MacLennan, Refuse.

Quebec and some other provinces objected, arguing that Ottawa regards as its exclusive constitutional power, could affect the provinces. They sought a clarification, as it has been done.

The upshot has been agreement to amend the formula to be replaced by a provision in the amending formula itself, to become a separate piece of legislation, allowing Parliament to make amendments only after winning the consent of all or some of the provinces, depending on the subject.

Basically, Parliament could make laws in fields belonging constitutionally to the provinces if at least four of them agree. But these laws would have no effect in provinces that don't agree. Similarly, the provinces could enact laws within the federal sphere of jurisdiction, but only if at least four of them agree. If such laws are not parliament agreed.

Either side could withdraw its consent at any time.

All of this would become known as the Constitution of Canada Amendment Act.

The communique outlined in general terms the formula accepted. It included:

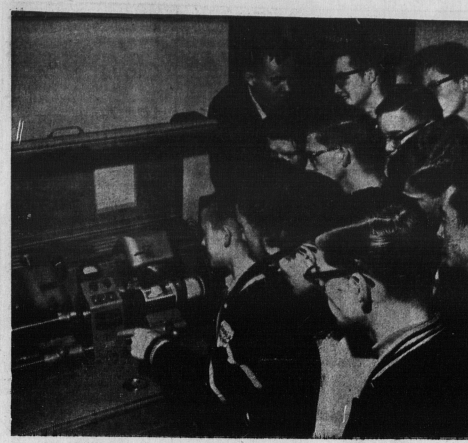

The federal-provincial conference agreed that the constitution of Canada and the governments of the provinces would from time to time study, in the light of experience, the working of the Canadian constitution and any revision proposals which may be submitted by one of the governments.

There was no mention Wednesday, however, of what changes will be sought.

Premier Lesage noted the Quebec legislature has a special committee studying possible amendments to the Canadian constitution. Among the proposals before that committee is one for a complete rewriting of the entire document.

However, Quebec Education Minister Paul Gerin-Lajole, an expert on the constitution and a committee member, said it would be "a number of months" before the committee reports.

Meanwhile, Premier Lesage described agreement on the formula as "a great achievement." It was an historic event.
