Quality Of Spuds Rated 'Excellent'

Prince Edward Island potatoes are of excellent quality this year, it was learned yesterday from Garth Harrison, acting district inspector, fruit and vegetable department, which includes supervision of table stock potatoes.

Tests conducted Thursday in the research department, Experimental Farm, showed samples scoring from 18.3 to 21.5 per cent dry matter content, which is an evidence of excellent eating quality.

This is most unusually high—previous potato inspectors like former district inspector, W.P. MacLeod, report they never heard of potatoes scoring that high before.

Mr. MacLeod recalled that at the Maritime Winter Fair, which was the Maritime show place for agricultural products, he cannot recall any dry matter content running higher than 17 or 18 per cent.

The development was viewed here yesterday as one of the reasons for the success of the new service club in the village.

BY-LAW TO INCLUDE AN AREA OF THE FORMER SCHOOL DISTRICT OF SPRING PARK WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTETOWN

WHEREAS it is deemed to be of advantage to the Citizens of the City of Charlottetown to extend the limits of the said City to include the area hereinafter defined so that economy and efficiency of essential services, being now primarily school accommodation and water supply, may be had by co-operation of operator and extension.

AND WHEREAS the final and effective passing of this By-law is intended to be conditioned upon the approval as required by the Municipal Extensions Act of the residents of the area intended to be included.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Common Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1. THAT from and after the passing of this By-law the corporate limits of the City of Charlottetown shall be enlarged and extended to include the area comprising that portion of the former school district of Spring Park which was not included within the limits of the Village of Spring Park as heretofore taken into the corporate limits of the City of Charlottetown, that said area is described as follows:

COMMENCING at a point where the North boundary of the City of Charlottetown is intersected by the Canadian National Railway right-of-way; thence Westerly along the North boundary of the City of Charlottetown to the shore of the North River; thence Northerly along the East shore of the North River and Ellen's Creek to Hermitage Creek so marked on Macdonald's Atlas; thence Easterly along the said last mentioned Creek and the South boundary of James Emman's land to the Malpeque Road; thence northerly along said road to Scotia boundary of Robert Wigmore's land; thence Easterly along Wigmore's South line to the Western side of the Canadian National Railway right-of-way, and thence Southerly following that Canadian National Railway to the point of commencement.

2. That upon the approval, and final enactment of this by-law such area shall constitute an addition to and be part of Ward 63 of the said City.

3. That the said City will immediately make available or provide school accommodation for the area.

4. That the City will provide police and fire protection for the area.

5. That the City will provide street maintenance for the area.

6. That the City will proceed to design and install water service for the area to provide such service within five years from the final enactment of this by-law, and if necessary by the City augmenting the funds of the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply.

7. That the City will provide sewerage service for the area at such time in its discretion as sewerage service shall appear practicable and necessary.

8. That the valuation of real property in the area assessed for the year 1967-1968 in the Spring Park school district as improved property shall remain unamalgamated for the years 1962 to 1968 (both inclusive), but the general tax rate of the City shall be applied to such valuation. All other real estate in the area thereafter and hereafter assessed as improved property shall be valued by the scheduled rating system of the City, as shall all real estate in the area after the year 1968.

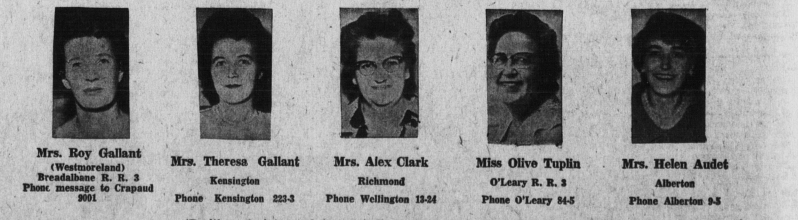
Sunday, September 30th — St. Eleanors, Miscouche and Wellington.
