

# C. And B. Score 8-1 Victory Over R.C.A.F. In League Game At S'side

The Curran & Briggs ball team put up the smartest defense they have shown in some time behind Alan Stewart's 4-hit pitching and defeated the R.C.A.F. Royals in a regular fixture at C. & B. ball park yesterday by the lopsided score of 8 to 1. Stewart gave up ten walks, two of them intentional, and struck out six. He was particularly good when the heat was on, retiring the side when the bases were loaded in the fourth, fifth and sixth innings. He struck out the last man in the fourth and fifth, but a double by McCulloch off the threat in the sixth. McCulloch, Airforce flogger, was hit rather hard, eleven bingles being collected off his delivery.

The only error made by the construction crew was committed by Stewart himself when he threw the ball into the dirt trying to catch Cox off first in the sixth inning. The Airforce committed three miscues. Feature fielding efforts were fairly plentiful. Bill Allen contributed one especially smart play in the third inning on Richard's hard hit grounder to him. The old fox scooped it up and threw it to first to rob Richard of what looked like a sure hit. Davis at first made a smart pick-up of Mitchell's low throw in the sixth to complete the only double play of the game. Stan Richard went far back of second base to rob Mitchell of a Texas Leaguer in the fourth. Stewart, Syl Bernard and Davis each cracked out a brace of hits for Curran & Briggs, and Frances and Richard divided the Airforce four bingles between them.

Local baseball fans were treated to a really smart game of ball at Memorial Field last evening when the Falcons took a 3-0 decision over the Abbies in a seven-innings Island League contest behind the one-hit pitching of Jack "Lefty" MacAleer. Going the full route on the mound for Falcons, MacAleer came within one inning of scoring a perfect no run, no hit performance, and although he was one hit and gave up two walks in the final innings but kept his shutout victory intact, for his first win of the season.

Performing on the mound for Abbies, Charley Ryan also came up with smart hurling duties to go the limit, and although he was credited with the loss, gave up only three hits, walked none and struck out three. MacAleer sent six batters down swinging. In the first four innings of play both teams turned in almost perfect performances, the Falcons having no runs, one hit and no errors during that time, with the Abbies the same except no hits. Jackie Cairns got the only hit for Falcons during that time when he got to Ryan's first toss of the game for a single over second base.

It was the top half of the fifth that Abbies got into trouble that cost them the game. Maurice Williams, first man at bat, singled to centre field, moved to second when Harold Hennessey took first on being hit with a pitched ball. Arnold McCallum was safe at first when Eddie Lund allowed McCallum's grounder to first get through him with Williams scoring the first run of the game. Kenny McKenzie, the next batter up, grounded out to Ryan, but Hennessey trying to steal home, got caught in a squeeze play but made it home when third baseman Joey Leclair hit Hennessey on the head and rolled past catcher Art Perry, allowing McCallum to score. Mackenzie had come round from second to third on the play. Although Ryan struck out the next two batters, MacAleer and Cairns, to retire the side, the damage was done and the Falcons got the only three runs of the ball game for their shutout victory. It was a tough battle for Abbies, and the only thing that marred an otherwise perfect game. Those things do happen, however, and are very often the deciding factors that win and lose ball games.

The Abbies made a determined bid in the last of the seventh when they had two men on base. MacAleer spoiled his perfect pitching performance by leading the bases when he gave up two walks and a single. Briar Lewis, batting for Howatt, walked and stole second. Ryan singled with a grounder between first and second and Perry completed the picture with a walk. The play was in a tight spot, but came through with the gods when he sent Maurice Flynn, who went in to bat for Lund, down swinging to end the ball game.

The Falcons' victory puts them in a tie position for second place with Summerside R.C.A.F. in the standing of the four-team loop with one win and a loss each. Summerside Curran and Briggs are at the top of the League with two wins, having clipped the R.C.A.F. Royals with an 8-1 decision at the Western Capital yesterday for their second straight victory. Abbies are in the cellar with two losses in two starts.

All four teams will see action again Sunday, when the Abbies will be at home to the C and B nine over Memorial Field and the Falcons will be the visitors to the Western Centre where they will clash with R. C. A. F. Royals. With interest mounting daily with the progress of the League ball fans in both centres should witness some keen ball over this coming week-end.

Played before a well filled ball park the Falcons exploded for three runs in the top half of the fifth frame to earn their verdict.

MacAleer retired the first twenty men in order before yielding a walk to Brian Lewis. Lewis then stole second and Ryan singled for the only Abbie hit of the game. Perry followed this with a walk to load the bases. Maurice Flynn then came in to bat for Eddie Lund. But MacAleer proved to be the winner in this bout by whiffing Flynn after the count had run to the full margin.

The winners' runs were unearned but proved to be sufficient to win the game. Maurice Williams started the rally off when he singled to center on a Texas leaguer. Harold Hennessey then was hit and McCallum followed this with a ground ball to Lund at first. Lund, however, let the ball go through him with Williams going all the way around from second on the play. Hennessey took third and McCallum went to second on the next pitch. On an attempted pickoff play at third Leclair hit Hennessey on the head with the ball and two more runs came across the platter.

Charley Ryan on the mound for the losers matched MacAleer pitch for pitch until the fatal fifth. He walked none, hit one batter and struck out three. MacAleer walked two and whiffed six Abbie bats.

# Big Four Team Planned As Community Project

The first meeting of the newly-appointed 11-man committee, which will organize and carry out a survey campaign to see if sufficient money can be raised to sponsor a Charlottetown hockey team in the Maritime Senior Big Four Hockey League next winter, was held last evening presided over by the committee chairman, Major T. B. Rogers.

Speaking before the meeting, Rogers stressed the point that the project is not one backed by individual enterprise but a community project to bring "Big Four" hockey back to this Province. "The aim is not to ask the public for cash donations, but rather to ask them to purchase \$5 holding tickets and a minimum of five tickets for next winter's games."

The chairman pointed out that the holding ticket simply means that it will guarantee the purchaser a particular seat in the Forum for the full season, including playoffs, and that it, along with the sale of a minimum of five game tickets, will give the organization a working capital to form a team and carry on the development of the venture.

It was decided by the meeting, that the campaign will be carried out in the usual manner, with a campaign chairman, divisional commanders, team captains and teams of workers, and for the moment, will be confined strictly to the City as a survey to public support and reaction. If the City survey shows sufficient interest, then the drive will be extended to other centres and areas throughout the Province, to give everyone the same opportunity of taking part.

"It is strictly a Provincial or community project," Major Rogers stated "and when the time comes to select team management, etc., every ticketholder will have a vote in its selection."

It was also decided that the public will not be asked to make cash purchases immediately, but will only be required to fill in a card or form endorsing their commitment to support the effort, and that actual payment can be made over the months of August, September, October and November.

Members of the committee stressed the importance of having the full support of the general public to make the venture possible, and of the time limit involved, which is only until June 25th, before a definite decision must be reached to make final application for entry to the M. S. H. L. executive.

It was the decision of the committee to hold meetings every evening this week to perfect the drive which will get underway officially on Monday of next week.

# Keen Interest In Fight Here Tomorrow Night

Can a good middleweight take the measure of the present ranking heavyweight or can a good little man lick a good big man? This is the \$4-dollar question on the tongues of all the fight fans in Prince Edward Island when referring to the scrap tomorrow night at the Forum here between George "Big Boy" Peterson, the present holder of the heavyweight boxing title of P. E. I. and Cobby McCloskey of Dartmouth, one of the best of the middleweight crop in Eastern Canada. Opinion in some quarters is evenly divided as both sluggers have their backers and argue their points on the different merits of their favourite. One thing is certain and that is, both boys have trained faithfully and are in the pink of condition for this, the most important scrap of their career, and they will both have the same thought in mind and that is, to win the affair as quickly as possible.

All will agree that McCloskey is the better boxer. He has a lethal punch in both hands and is in superb condition. He is trained down as keen as a razor and to use his own words "the best condition of my life." He is faster on his feet than the champion and will have to use this advantage along with his superior boxing skill and well-timed punches in both hands to offset the boring-in tactics of his heavier opponent and not be on the receiving end of too many of Peterson's hay-makers. The latter will not find McCloskey as easy a target to hit as many of the men he has met in the past, yet Peterson may use his extra poundage to wear down his opponent and set him up for the sleep producer.

Some are of the opinion that Cobby will outbox the big fellow and set him up for a one-two punch that will give the referee a counting job. Both boys are confident of victory but one of them is going to be disappointed after the main bout Friday night as the go cannot end in a draw. One must be better than the other, and tomorrow night will decide.

It has taken three years to make this match and interest is running so high that a packed house will probably greet the first card of the season at the Forum. Prices are low for a championship match with the advance sale at the Forum opening Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

The semi-final should produce a humdinger when the ever pleasing Bud Lund, lightweight champion of the province crawls through the ropes to swap punches with Bobby Gallant, another lightweight with an impressive string of eight victories in 20 starts in the professional ranks. Bobby has picked up some valuable pointers in his campaigning on the other side and will probably give the clever Lund plenty of trouble.

The usual pleasing Forum preliminaries will round out what is expected to be a crowd pleasing

**Athletics End 7-Game Losing Streak, Defeat Detroit Tigers 8 To 2**

Philadelphia Athletics ended a seven-game losing streak at the hands of league-leading Detroit Tigers yesterday (Wednesday) when they trounced the Detroiters 8-2 in an American League fixture.

The National League meanwhile had its greatest battle with the weather when three games—Pittsburgh at New York, Chicago at Brooklyn and Cincinnati at Boston—were rained out.

The setback did not cost the Tigers anything in their first-place American League duel with the New York Yankees, who dropped their second straight decision to Chicago White Sox 5-2 and still remained a half game behind the Detroit club.

Left-hander Lou Brissie turned in a six-hit pitching job for the Athletics. Brissie, who failed to finish his last three starts, was rough on the Detroiters as none got more than one hit.

Paul (Dizzy) Trout, the Detroit starting hurler, came up against some heavy stickwork. He was battered for five runs and six hits in five innings to receive his first defeat after four straight triumphs. Hal White and Montreal's Paul Calvert finished up for Detroit.

Joe Page failed for the second straight day as Dave Philley greeted the ace reliever with a three-run homer in the last of the ninth to give Chicago the nod over the Yankees. Philley's smash climaxed a great rally in which the White Sox scored four times after two were out and the bases empty.

The win was the fourth in succession for Chicago, their longest winning streak of the season. The long drive earned Bill Wight the decision over Allie Reynolds. Wight had yielded only six hits to nine for the Yankee right-hander until the explosive finish.
