### SUPREME COURT.

George Thorne Acquitted—Peter Keenan on Trial To-day

FRIDAY, Jan 20.

At the afternoon session yesterday Attorney-General Macdonald finished his address to the jury in the Thorne case, after which they were charged by Chief Justice Sullivan. About half-past five the jury retired, and some fifteen minutes later they intimated that they had agreed upon a verdict. By this time, however, His Lordship had retired for dinner, and the verdict could not be rendered until he returned. About seven o'clock, after His Lordship had taken his place upon the bench, the jury filed into the room, and, in reply to the usual question by the clerk, returned a verdict of "Not Guilty." Upon motion of the prisoner's counsel, Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., he was discharged from custody.

The Queen vs. Peter Keenan. Indictment against the prisoner. The trial of this case began at 10:30 this forenoon, before the Chief Justice and the following jury: G. A. Crosby, foreman; Neil McKenzie, J. B. Crosby, John Boyce, Marcus Ferguson, Neil Campbell, Edward Harrington, Daniel McDonald, Augustus Doull and Reuben Barrett.

Attorney-General for the Crown; W. S. Stewart, Q. C., for the prisoner.

The Winnipeg Tribune reports that Mr. John Craig, a native of Malpeque, and for a number of years bookkeeper for Messrs. W. & A. Brown & Co., Charlottetown, was, presented, on behalf of the St. Giles Sunday school, Winnipeg, of which he is superintendent, at the school's annual Christmas entertainment, with a bicycle and Persian lamb collar and mitts. The presentation was made by the pastor, who spoke in high terms of Mr. Craig and the affection in which he is held by teachers and pupils. Mr. Craig left the Island about fifteen years ago, and has since been living in Winnipeg. For the past eight years he has been cashier for the Northern Pacific Railway Company.

### Borrowing a Horse.

In his interesting book, "The Lawyers of Maine," Willis relates an anecdote of Judge George Thatcher, who was noted for his humor.

Solicitor Davis and Judge Thatcher, when boys, were neighbors in Barnstable and Yarmouth, Mass. The day after the battle of Bunker Hill the militia of these towns set off for Boston. The boys accompanied the soldiers, Davis acting as fifer. A few miles out from Barnstable an order came directing the military to return home.

In their retreat Thatcher and Davis, tired of their march, mounted an old horse they met on the road, without saddle or bridle. After riding some miles they dismounted and abandoned their steed in the highway.

Many years after Davis, as solicitor general, was prosecuting a horse thief before Judge Thatcher in the county of Kennebec, Me. In the course of the trial the judge leaned over the bench and said in an undertone to the solicitor:

"Davy, this reminds me of the horse you and I stole in Barnstable."

THE WEATHER.—Westerly and south-westerly winds, fair and mild.

FIREMEN'S DINNER.—The firemen's dinner will take place at the Hotel Davies on the evening of the 7th February.

AT THE CAPES.—Boats crossed both ways to-day. The special from Cape Traverse reached the city at 1.50 o'clock.

EXCHANGE OF PULPITS.—On Sunday next Rev. W. J. Kirby, of Charlottetown, and Dr. Sprague, of Summerside, exchange pulpits.

HOCKEY.—Don't miss the matches next week. Victorias vs. St. John on Tuesday evening and Abegweits vs. St. John on Wednesday evening.

I. O. G. T.—At the meeting of Charlottetown Lodge held last night a thoughtful paper on Hygiene was read by Dr. Ayres, for which he was tendered a vote of thanks.

MEETING OF CREDITORS.—The creditors of E. A. Small & Co., met in Montreal yesterday. The liabilities of the firm are about \$340,000, and the assets \$146,000. W. C. Pinfild & Co, St. John, are endorsers for \$14,212 61.

LABORERS IN BOMBAY.—An able-bodied agricultural laborer, according to a United States Consular report, receives from \$1.80 to 2.50 per month in Bombay. The cost of the laborer's food is from 2½c to 3½c per day.

BAPTIST CHURCH.—The attendance at the evangelistic service last evening was the largest of the week. Rev. A. F. Browne preached, after which a social service was held. This afternoon at half-past three a meeting for prayer will be held in the vestry, to which all Christians are invited. At 7 there will be a meeting for the young people, and at 8 the regular evangelistic service will be held, to which all are invited. There will not be any meeting on Saturday evening.

FOR THE HOSPITAL.—The concert and basket social in the Lyceum last evening was well attended, and every one had a good time. The interesting programme of vocal and instrumental music prepared for the occasion was rendered in an excellent manner, and to the evident satisfaction of the large assemblage. The sale of baskets was conducted by Mr. E. H. Norton, and good prices were obtained. The affair was in aid of the Charlottetown Hospital, and the amount realized was about \$150. The promoters are to be congratulated.

THE STANLEY.—The steamer Stanley arrived at Georgetown from Pictou yesterday afternoon about four o'clock, and about six in the evening, in pursuance of instructions from the Marine Department left in search of four fishermen who are missing from Bonaventure Island, Quebec. It seems that these men were on the ice at the shore on Bonaventure Island when the ice separated and drifted seaward with its living freight. The Stanley returned to Georgetown this afternoon, not being able to make her way through heavy ice between East Point and the Cape Breton shore.

A KLONDIKE IRELAND.—According to late advices the lovely Vale of Avoca the County of Wicklow, made famous by Thomas Moore's melodies, may prove to be the Klondike of Ireland. For some time past alluvial gold in an appreciable amount has been found in the neighbouring streams, and the Government is setting seriously to work to investigate. A South African expert has been sent to explore for the mother lode, and geologists believe there is a chance of finding a rich auriferous vein. County Wicklow is noted for its mineral deposits. Copper, lead, and silver have been profitably worked in the past.
