YOUNG CONSERVATIVES.

The meeting of Young Liberal-Conservatives to be held to night in the Hall of the Benevolent Irish Society, should be largely attended. The meeting is for organization. No time is to be lost. The enemy is working energetically, and as the elections may be sprung on the people at any moment it is well to be prepared.

BEFORE AND AFTER.

WHEN Sir Louis Davies was in opposition he labored hard to increase the salaries of the judges. He also deplored the extravagance of the Conservatives, the high price of kerosene oil and the very low price of oats. What has he done since he obtained power? He has increased the salaries of the judges. Did he remove the specific duties? Not he. Instead, he increased the price of the poor man's tobacco, and gave the monopolists control of the oil. And everyone knows the millstone of debt he has succeeded in fastening about the necks of the people!

A TRICK THAT IS VAIN.

The approaching visit of Sir Charles Tupper, Hon. Hugh John Macdonald and Hon. Geo. E. Foster, is made the text of an article in last evening's Patriot. The article is personal and barren of argument. The reference to the promises it says, Sir Charles will make is intended to divert attention from the pre-election promises of the Liberals. But the scheme will not work. The people are familiar with the Liberal record and know that it is one of broken promises. The Patriot should make some attempt to explain away the many breaches of faith on the part of Sir Louis and his colleagues. It cannot deceive the electors by its red-herring tactics.

EAST QUEEN'S

THE Liberal convention called to meet in Charlottetown at ten o'clock this morning for the purpose of nominating a candidate to contest East Queen's was late in meeting and slow in getting to work. In fact it was not until one o'clock that the result of the convention was announced. The Hon. B. A. McKinnon, Attorney-General of the Province and Law Agent of the Laurier Government, received a majority of votes and was chosen as the opponent of Alexander Martin, the sitting member. Several polling districts were not represented at the convention, and the meeting was not at all harmonious. On the contrary it was anything but harmonious, and there was a lack of enthusiasm amongst the delegates. The majority of the meeting was in favor of Dr. Robertson, and his supporters are not all pleased at the choice of the convention. Some of them are not slow in stating that Martin will have a walk-over on election day as McKinnon will have no show with the electors. We agree with them.

—It is reported that Mr. Tarte is to be appointed Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba in succession to Lieutenant Governor Patterson.

THE BAPTIST CONVENTION.

Temperance and Other Reports—Moncton Next Year.

HALIFAX, Aug. 29.—At the Baptist convention yesterday morning the report of the twentieth century fund committee was discussed and adopted with the understanding that the home missions referred to in it would include the Maritime Provinces, Northwest, Grand Ligne and British Columbia.

The report on the fund for ministerial relief and aid was adopted.

The report from the committee on correspondence approved of the organization of a provincial prohibition convention at Moncton.

The report on temperance was discussed and adopted.

The committee on estimates reported giving the same distributions as last year.

A resolution to the effect that the Baptist national convention be invited to hold its next meeting within the bounds of the Maritime Provinces was adopted.

The convention decided to meet at Moncton next year, after which it adjourned.

Coal Famine in Newfoundland.

St. John's, Nfld., August 29.—A coal famine now threatens the colony of Newfoundland. The establishing of smelting enterprise at Sydney absorbs the greater part of the Cape Breton output; and the failure of Reid's mines leaves the colony without any local product.

Sydney coal has advanced 30 per cent and there is probably not enough to supply the winter's demand. Mr. Reid, the railway contractor, is likely to be the most affected, his train and steamer absorbing fully a third of the entire colonial coal import.
