HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says cooler air to the west of the Great Lakes will spread slowly eastward toward the district. However this cool air is not expected to move farther south than central New Brunswick before this evening and as a result cooler weather will spread only into northern New Brunswick. The rest of the district will continue to have 70 and 80 degree temperatures. Cloud and showers will spread slowly southward across the district late today.

## Forecasts:

Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, eastern N.B. counties, Lower St. John River Valley: Sunny, becoming cloudy in afternoon with showers by evening; hot; southwesterly winds 15. Low-high at Halifax 55 and 80, Yarmouth 45 and 60, Moncton and Kentville 55 and 85, New Glasgow and Goshe 50 and 85, Sydney 45 and 80, Charlottetown 45 and 75, Fredericton 60 and 85, Saint John 55 and 75.

Upper St. John River Valley, Bay of Chaleur: Cloudy with showers beginning in afternoon; hot, but turning much cooler by evening; southwesterly winds 15, shifting in evening to northwest 15. Low-high at Edmundston and Campbellton 50 and 80.

Bay of Fundy: Westerly winds 15; clear, becoming cloudy with showers by afternoon; fog developing in afternoon; visibility 10 miles, lowering in showers to two miles and in fog to near zero; temperatures in 50s.

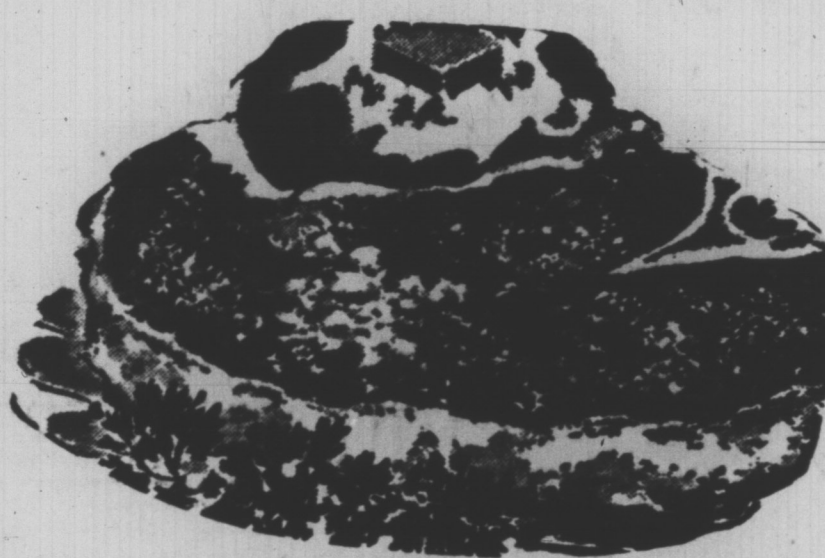

## Anglican J. A. Festival Held At Camp Kingston

The Anglican Church Centre at Crapaud was the scene of a delightful gathering on Saturday May 23rd., when the girls and boys of the Junior Auxiliary met for their Annual Festival. The sun shone brightly as the procession of children wound its way from the hall to the Church for their service of worship. In their green and white uniforms, with each parish carrying their green and gold banner they seemed to blend with the natural scenery around them.

For the adults the service in the Church was a deeply moving one. As the children's voices rose and fell in their J.A. prayers, in the hymns—"The Wise may bring their learning", and "Fairer Lord Jesus", and finally in their beautiful rendering of the Benedicite (which was the theme of their worship for the year), one felt they had caught the true spirit of praise and adoration it called for. They were accompanied, most sympathetically on the organ (and later on the piano) by Miss Muriel Haslam of Springfield.

The Rev. D.S.H. Minton (Rector of St. John's, Crapaud), conducted the service and held the rapt attention of the children with his address on the text—"Put on the whole armour of God", Eph. 6:11. Mr. Minton compared the work and service of the J.A. to that of the knights of old. As described in the Bible, if a young man wished to wear shining armour of a knight, he must first spend the whole night in prayer, then learn how to fight, be willing to give his all for his King and country and to help others. So, also the J.A.'s must pray, and serve the King of Kings by putting on the whole armour of God to fight evil and to help others.

At the conclusion of the service the J.A.'s of Crapaud had their new banner dedicated, while groups from the different parishes received badges, stripes and pins (for attendance). Six girls were promoted into the Girls' Auxiliary and were later invited to be guests at the Annual meeting of the G.A.'s on May 30th. The procession then marched back to the hall where children and adults were welcomed by Mrs. Robert Currie, the Diocesan J.A. Secretary-Treasurer and by Mr. Minton.
