Acadian Teachers Convention At S'side Concludes

The second and final day of the annual Acadian teachers convention concluded late yesterday afternoon after sessions which lasted all day. All the meetings were held in St. Paul's Hall, Summerside. In the morning a requiem high mass for the deceased members of the Association was celebrated in St. Paul's Church by Rev. J.H. LeClair.

THE first item on the agenda for the morning session was an address by Inspector Frank E. Dolron in which he dealt with the necessity of a good vocabulary and how to help the pupils to attain this. He spoke of the improvements in school property brought about by a Government grant. In his inspection 29 schools are in the process of being renovated and several new ones have been built in the last three years.

Dr. J.H. Blanchard quoted from a report on the Carnegie Libraries Human nature in P.E.I. is second to none in North America but it has no chance. MacLeod of Summerside addressed the convention speaking on the importance of training the child during its youth and of keeping up bilingual teaching.

The question box was handled by Inspector Dolron and Mr. Elmer Pincou. This was followed by a most interesting and lively discussion on the choice of French readers. A committee consisting of Rev. Sister St. Alcide, Inspector Dolron and Miss Helen Gallant was appointed to choose a series of books and have them adopted.

Judge J.S. DesRoches proposed that a committee consisting of Rev. Sister St. Alcide, Rev. Sister St. Emmanuel, Mr. Frank Dolron, Mr. Elmer Pincou and Miss Helen Gallant should investigate the teaching of French on the Island and have a written report for the next convention.

Dr. L.W. Shaw, director of education spoke to the convention and said that although the world is in a state of confusion and turmoil if teachers have faith they may bring peace to our troubled times. Money wasted on strikes could be spent so profitably in doing good.

requiring air passage. Earlier, the A.T.B. after consultation with the carriers issued a schedule of priorities on air travel which may be invoked either by the air lines or by the A.T.B.

Mr. Baldwin said a committee of Government and commercial carrier officials also has recommended and the A.T.B. has authorized:

1. Non-scheduled carriers who have about 90 large and small aircraft at their disposal to fly over scheduled routes carrying cargo. This breach of the regulations will be allowed for the duration of the rail strike.

2. These non-scheduled carriers also have been authorized to work in close liaison with scheduled carriers in the movement of passengers.

Mr. Baldwin said the committee also has recommended that customs regulations on the importation of foreign aircraft be relaxed so further aircraft may be brought into Canada quickly if needed.

"Every effort will be made to meet this request," Mr. Baldwin said.

The priority system, said Mr. Baldwin, could be put into effect at any time. It could be put in operation by any carrier to apply to his own route or it could be put into operation by the A.T.B.

the A.T.B. to apply to all Canadian routes. Top priority would go to the mails. Other priority ratings: 1. Emergency movement of passengers requiring hospital or medical attention or of a doctor or nurse to attend a patient and emergency movement of medical supplies.

2. Passengers and goods named by the Transport Department's priority officer as requiring transportation "in the public interest."

If it became necessary to displace passengers or goods already accepted for transport, the following order of displacement would be adopted:

1. Passengers travelling for pleasure, on leave or on furlough.

2. Passengers travelling on private business.

3. Perishable goods transported for the general welfare of the public.

4. Passengers travelling on public business of an urgent nature, or for national defence.
