MRS. STANFORD GLOVER (inserted by husband and brothers). The communities of Bradabane and Norborne were saddened to hear of the sudden passing of Mrs. Stanford Glover in the P.E.I. Hospital, on February 17th, 1965. Mrs. Glover had been in failing health for some months, and although the end came very suddenly, it was not unexpected.

Mrs. Glover was born in North Wilkesboro, on August 19th, 1900. The daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Henderson. In 1919 she married Stanford Glover and came to live in Norborne, where she proved herself to be a faithful neighbour, always willing to help those in need, and a loyal member of the Women's Institute of that district. In 1947 she and her husband came to live in Bradabane, where she won the respect and love of all who had the privilege of knowing her.

The hymns sung were, The Lord's My Shepherd, and Abide With Me, the organist was Mrs. Sterling Corbett. The pallbearers were, Elmer Wigmore, Archie Hutchinson, Sterling Nicholson, Alex C. McDonald, Everett Glover and Bert MacKay. Interment took place in the Floral Hills Memorial Gardens.

MONTREAL (CP) - United States dollar in terms of Canadian funds up 1-32 at 1.08-1.16. Pound sterling down 1-16 at 83.01-13.16.

NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP) - Steels rallied late Monday to help an irregular stock market post a modest gain. Trading was fairly active.

The news came to life following the steel works that weekly steel production had topped the record made two weeks ago.

International oils continued backward in view of the take-over of some U.S. oil properties in Syria.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose .86 to 896.84. Seven of the 15 most active stocks sold at 17 a share or less.

Of 1,362 issues traded, 629 rose and 466 fell. New highs for 1964-65 totalled 76 and new lows five.

Volume was 5,270,000 shares off from Friday's 6,150,000. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose 4 to 335.5.

A low-priced favorite, Loral Corp., topped the most-active list, rising 1/4 to 9 1/4 on 101,500 shares. Gold mining issues also ended far below their best levels of the day. Homestake held a gain of 1/4.

Among Canadian International Nickel and Walker Gooderham were up 1/4. Aluminum Ltd., Distillers Securities and Dome Mines were up 1/4.

McIntyre Porcupine was down 1/4 and Hudson Bay Mining dropped 1/4.

Prices were irregularly higher on the American exchange. Jupiter Corp. was up 1/4 and Molybdenite was up 1/4.

MONTREAL (CP) - Most sections were up in moderate industrial and heavy mines and oil trading Monday on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges.

Industrial volume was 183,000 shares and mines and oils 4,023,300. The composite index was up 0.4 at 162.7.

Utilities were up 0.7 at 167.9. CIL gained 1/4 to 25 1/4 and Asbestos 1/4 to 27 1/4.

Papers were up 0.8 at 146.7. Abitibi and Dominion-Tar each added 1/4 to 13 1/4 and 23 1/4 respectively. Banks remained unchanged at 138.8. Montreal A added 1/4 to 68 and Nova Scotia 1/4 to 81 1/4.

Utilities were off 0.6 at 157.1. Bell Telephone dropped 1/4 to 62 1/4 and CPR 1/4 to 67 1/4.

Metals were higher and trade and finance issues were up. Speculative mines were higher. Equity Explorations gained 18 cents to 17 1/2, Fox Lake 17 cents to 44 cents and Kiens Gold 40 cents to 43.10.

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P.E.I. Included In 3 Provinces With Milk Boost

OTTAWA (CP) - The production of milk in Canada last year totalled 18,690,629,000 pounds compared with 18,451,982,000 pounds in 1963, the bureau of statistics said Monday.

Production in 1964 was greater in Prince Edward Island, Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia, and lower in the other provinces.

The year's total, in thousands, with figures for 1963 in brackets: Prince Edward Island 245,400 (216,576), Nova Scotia 335,409 (345,660), New Brunswick 365,514 (367,200), Quebec 6,172,355 (6,236,466), Ontario 6,170,500 (6,149,251), Saskatchewan 1,065,197 (1,112,989), Alberta 1,719,411 (1,692,154), British Columbia 856,890 (841,160).

Some other percentage increases: Women's and misses' dresses and sportswear, 8.7 and 15.3, respectively; men's clothing 11.6; fur 5.1; home furnishings 10.8; furniture 9.8; major appliances 9.8; jewelry 11.9.

By provinces, the percentage gains were: Atlantic Provinces 8.8; Quebec 6; Ontario 11.2; Manitoba 6.8; Saskatchewan 9.8; Alberta 7; B.C. 11.6.
