SHIPPING CHINESE.—Arrangements have been made for the shipment of a large number of Chinese immigrants from Yokohama by the C. P. R. steamers to Vancouver, thence by the C. P. R. to Halifax and thence by Pickford & Black's steamer, Beta, to Havana. The first batch will leave Halifax on the Beta on May 14th. There are about twenty or thirty in the party.

A MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.—Henry Carver, an eleven-year-old son of Daniel Carver, while playing in a sawmill at Midville, Lunenburg, N. S., fell into the flume and was carried into the wheel which drives the circular saw. The gates were at once closed and he was rescued from his perilous position, having only sustained a few slight bruises. It is said the wheel must have made a hundred revolutions while the lad was in it. The escape from death is most miraculous.

THE HORSE MARKET.—Speaking of horses, Mr. W. S. McKie, a dealer who sells large numbers of Prince Edward Island horses every year, states the market here for good horses is as good this year as ever it was. Good horses will bring good prices. He even stated that the St. John market has been better at times this spring than the Boston market. Prices in the States have been very low. This was especially the case in respect to common driving horses and he thought this might be accounted for in part by the fact that so many street car companies are discarding horses and using electricity as motive power.—St. John Gazette.

Most people suppose that the manufacture of tobacco consists merely of taking the leaf and pressing and pressing it into plugs. The fact is, however, that the process is a very delicate one, and the least false step will injure the flavor. The leaf must be carefully attended to for months after it leaves the planter's hand. It must neither dry too quickly or too slowly. Even after it has reached the factory the utmost delicacy of manipulation is required. The weather must be carefully studied, for if there is too much moisture in the air when it is pressed it will mould, and the same will happen if too much moisture is sprinkled upon it for the purpose of opening the leaf. Again, if it is overdried in the oven it will turn crisp, and will nip the tongue in smoking. It is by careful attention to all these points that the "Myrtle Navy" has been brought to such perfection.

Personal.

The Ottawa Journal gives currency to a rumor that Mr. L. P. Kribs, of the Empire, will be the Conservative candidate for the new seat in Toronto west when another general election comes around. Mr. Malcolm A. Beaton, of Flat River, left this morning for the western states, where, we understand, a position awaits him. Mr. Beaton is just the stamp of a young man to succeed, and having a good commercial education we have no doubts of his success. An American Church paper says: At St. Clement's Church, Philadelphia, on Easter Day, there were five celebrations of the Holy Eucharist, the latter being a high celebration, with the rector, Rev. Father Davenport, as priest, the Rev. Father Owen-Jones deacon, and the Rev. A. J. Arnold sub-deacon. The Rev. Father Davenport, above-named, was the late rector of the Mission Church, St. John, N. B., and Father Owen-Jones is a brother of the Ven. Archbishop of Prince Edward Island, at present the hardworking and indefatigable parish priest of Windsor, N. S.

A Halifax despatch says: Rev. W. B. King has left for Cambridge, Mass., to interview the church wardens regarding his call and acceptance, and ascertain how long he may remain in Halifax before taking up his new charge. He is expected back in about a week. Rev. Mr. King has started several projects in connection with St. Luke's Cathedral here, and wishes a few months to make his successor familiar with these projects, so they can be carried out. There has been no formal meeting regarding his successor so far, but some of the parishioners favor Canon Partridge, and it is understood his name will be proposed. Rev. Mr. King will probably abandon for the present the three months European trip, on which he was to have started last week.
