## More Interest Seen In Deep-Sea Fishing

Deep sea sport fishing off the National Park area seems to be catching on very rapidly this summer. On Saturday at least six boats took tourists and others out and all had good catches. Some boats were out twice during the day. License plates on cars parked at Rustico were from Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, Quebec, Ontario, Nova Scotia and P.E.I.

This party consisted of Dr. George Crowl, Delaware, Ohio; Ken Lauterer, Chagrin Falls, Ohio; Franz Anderson, South Euclid, Ohio; Douglas Carmichael, Deep River, Ont.; Miss Barbara Rogers, and B. Graham Rogers, Charlottetown.

They all had good catches including a pollock caught on a spinning rod by Mr. Rogers which weighed 18 and one quarter pounds. The lure used was a red and white one and it took 23 minutes to land it. Two others were also caught by people in another boat and reported to be between eight and 10 pounds each. The names of these men were unavailable. Mr. Rogers said Pollock on a spinning rod really fight hard.

Fishermen at Rustico say that mackerel are very scarce yet, but one fisherman reported he spotted some about 10 miles off shore while commercial fishing for cod. The fishermen expect that fairly soon now they will be closer in shore. They also report small catches of commercial cod although on Saturday it was better. Good commercial catches should be made soon they hope.

Sport fishing off the North Shore is one that tourists enjoy immensely. A number of the fishermen have very nice boats now and they try to make the visitor's trip as enjoyable as possible. Most of the boats can take anywhere from four to eight on a trip.

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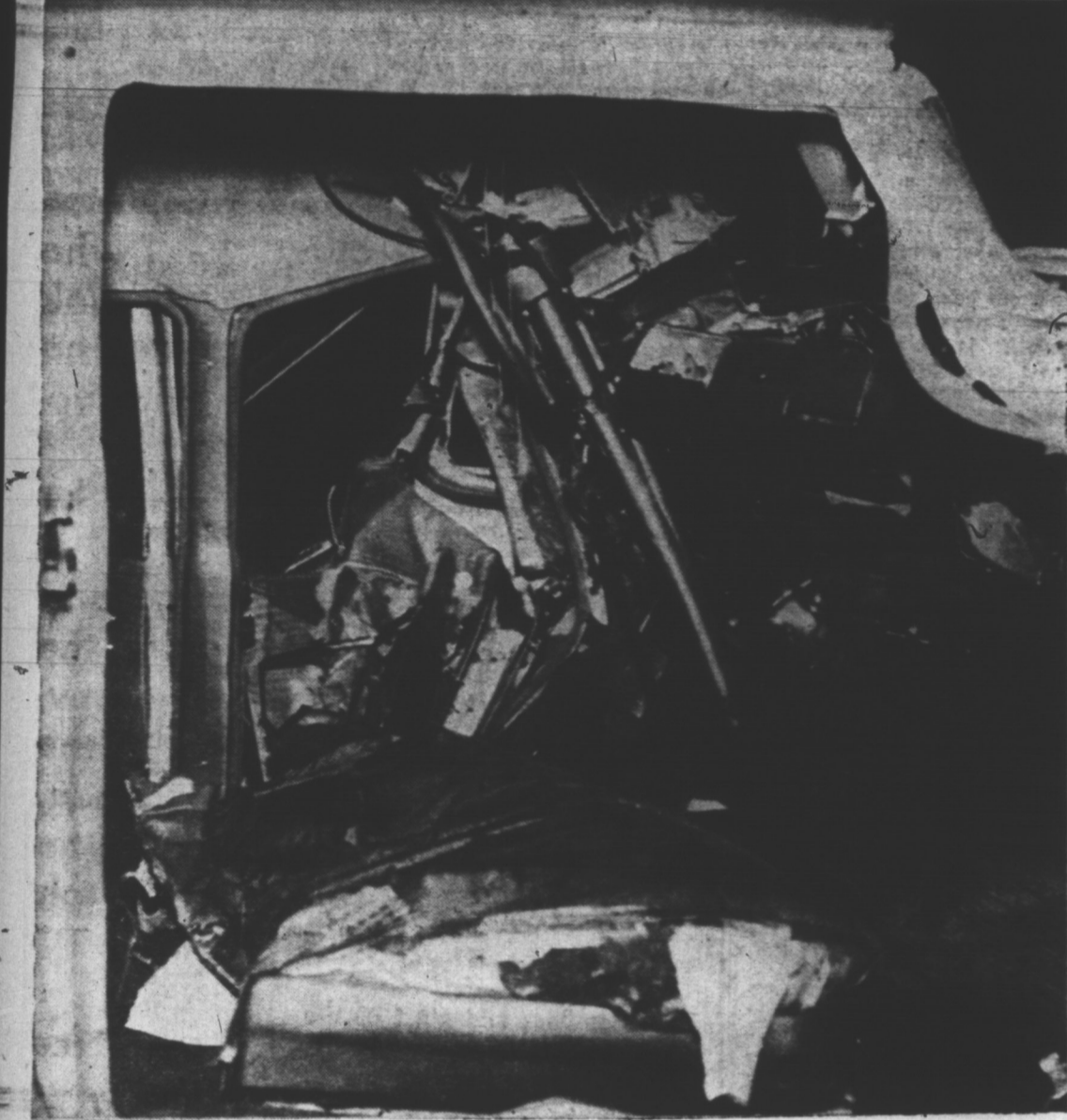
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## Funeral Services Are Held For Train-Car Crash Victims

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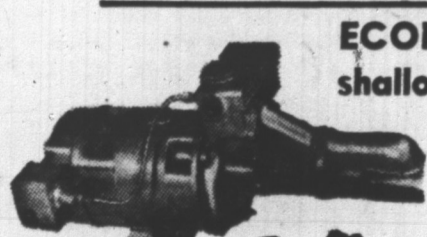

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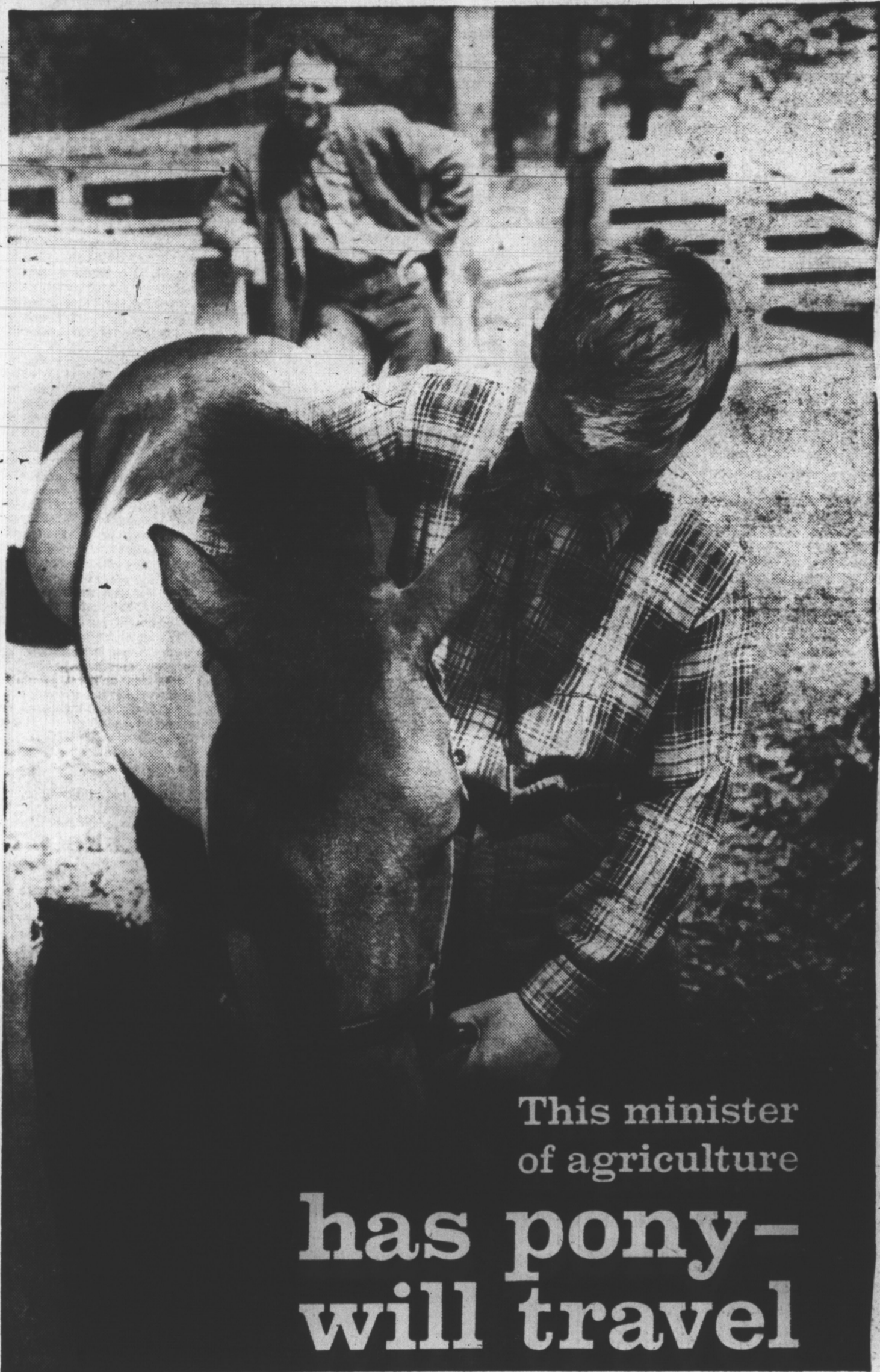
