IN THIS CORNER

Doomed to stay in the league cellar with a present record of one victory against four defeats, unless they snap out of it, Eastern Stars tonight will make a mighty effort to get out of the "doldrums" when they tangle with the Rovers in a City Baseball League fixture.

Apparently invincible the Rovers, no matter how they judge their lineup, always manage to come out on the big end of the score and if something is not done about it in quick order the league will not only lose the interest of the fans but that of the players as well.

On paper Rovers do not appear a bit stronger than their opponents but where the northern team have been as steady as a rock since the start of the season, the Rovers and once they manage to escape their "case of jitters" the league should assume some semblance of a close race and not the walkaway it is at present is.

But there is another matter and a mighty important one that should be remedied immediately. And that is unnecessary delay in the start of the games. Fans won't sit around an hour or more, as the case may be, waiting for disputes to be settled. This is well known by past experience.

Take Sunday's game for example. The largest crowd of the season was on hand at the scheduled starting time any on top of this was the fact that it was the finest baseball weather that the league has been graced with since the opening, but what happened?

The status of one of the Rovers' players was questioned. Anchors would not take the field against him while the Rovers would not play without him. Result: arguing and wrangling for over an hour until finally a solution was obtained and the player in question was forced to witness the game from the bench.

The Anchors were fully justified in their claim but why, in all common sense, should two teams leave a matter like this till just before game time to decide? By this action such matters out is long before the teams are ready to take the field. There has been entirely too much of this going on from the spectators point of view and sooner the management and players realize this the better it will be for the league.

But the aftermath of it all was that by the time the teams had decided to go on with the game only half the original number of fans were still present.

The fans showed plainly that while they were willing to see a ball game they will not sit idly by and watch arguments go on that should have been settled long before game time.

Both smart well-trained wrestlers the pair can furnish the fans with some of the most exciting wrestling if they so desire but the rivalry is so keen between the pair that usually their bouts end up with punches being thrown and whatever else they can come into the methods of attack.

Cooke Upsets Austin To Qualify For Tennis Finals At Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England, July 3.—(CP)—Ely Cooke of the United States swept favored Bunny Austin right off the centre court today and qualified with Bobby Riggs, another American, for the semi-finals of the All-England Tennis championship.

Cooke hit homers off Bunny's dew-drop service all afternoon and beat him with the loss of only four games, 6-3, 6-0, 6-1.

Riggs, who was seeded second to Austin, won over Ghaus Mohammed, India, 6-2, 6-2, 6-2, and now will meet Ferenc Fancsic in the semi-finals. The Yugoslav ace defeated Gene Smith, California schoolmaster who was handicapped by an arm injury, 6-0, 6-2, 6-2.

Henner Henkel of Germany, who defeated Franz Kukuluevic of Yugoslavia, 6-1, 6-3, 6-2, in the other quarter-final, will be Cooke's next opponent.

After Cooke had overwhelmed Austin, everybody began noticing a similarity in his technique and that of Don Budge. Actually, there is a great deal of similarity.

Three Tied In Opening Round Of British Open

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 3.—(AP)—Jim Bruen, a cocksure young Irishman, Lawson Little, a burley American, and Percy Allis, veteran English international, today threw their shadows athwart the path of the 240 contenders for the British Open Golf Championship.

While some of the biggest names in British golf, stalemated by the two tortuous St. Andrews courses, floundered around in the high 70's these three set the pace in the first day's qualifying round with magnificent 69's.

Bruen and Little shot theirs on the par-73 old course, and the young man from Cork thus tied Bobby Jones' amateur record for the par-73 old course, and the most famous 18 in the world.

Little was two strokes off the professional record set by Bill Nolan for the same layout.

Allis turned in his score, three under par, on the new course. He had the putting touch that always has kept him in the front rank of British golfers, and he will be tough in this tournament, which fell up with another 18-hole qualifying round tomorrow and then 72 holes of championship proper for the 139 elite scorers beginning Wednesday.

Trailing the three leaders were as varied a crew as ever contested the Open's munificent reward of £100 (\$500). There were Americans—Johnny Bulla of Chicago, with a 73, was well up and well regarded. Argentinian—Martin Pose matched Bulla's total and looked as if he knew just what he was doing every second—and a half dozen Australians, Swiss and Belgians.

The second best scores were made by outsiders—William Hastings, a veteran Scot pro, and Norman Sutton of Cheshire, who's breaking included two British tournaments for eight years without any great success. Both had 71's.

Behind them came Bulla, Pose and a flock of others at 72. This clash between Joe Gans and Billington Nelson, the challenger, was settled July 4, 1908, at Columbia. Nelson flattened Gans after 17 rounds.

Altimead George, driven by W. Dennison; Queen's Mac, driven by Carl Hill; Zipalong, driven by Rube Parker, and Optimist, driven by Townsend Ackerman, spoiled the start of the first heat and the starter removed all four drivers. They were replaced by Delvin Miller, David Maher, Paul Vineyard and Houston Stone.

Queen's Mac, Optimist and Show Lassie collided at the half mile post in the first heat but horses and drivers were uninjured.

Gardner won the belt, knocking out Root in 12 rounds, but lost the title to Bob Fitzsimmons in a 20-round decision in November of the same year.

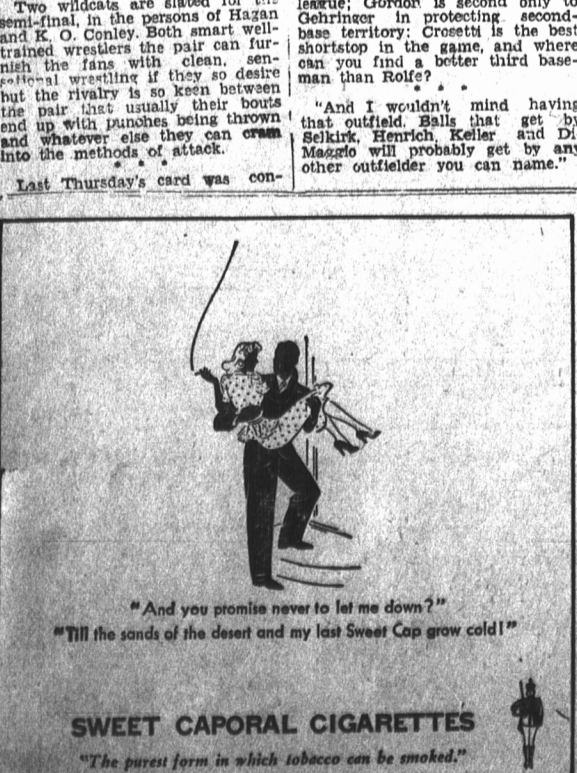

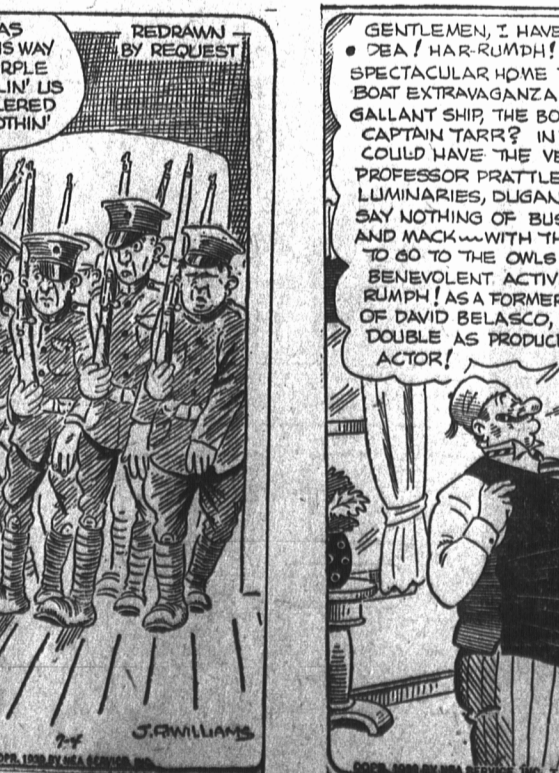

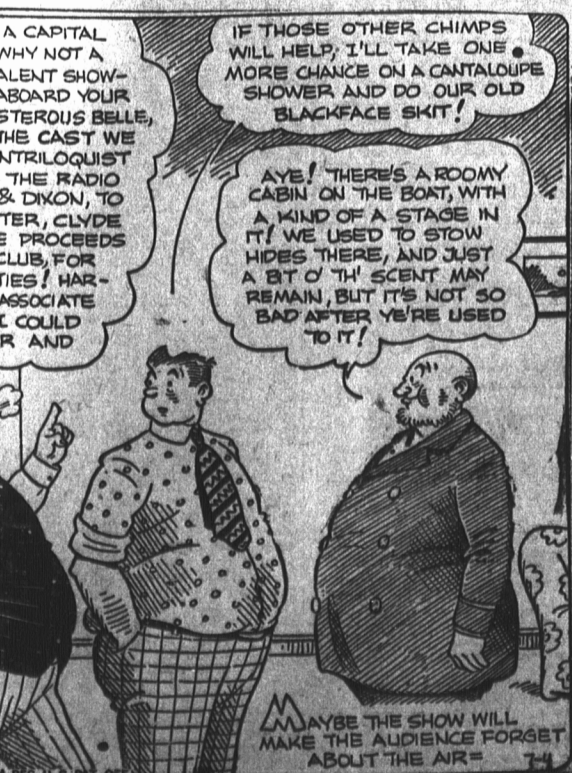
