

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

MONTREAL, Sept. 16.

About 10,000 people witnessed the fireworks in Fletcher's field. The exhibition is described as very successful. The cattle forwarded from Prince Edward Island safely reached the Exhibition grounds to-day.

AFGHANISTAN.

CAPE TOWN, Sept. 16.

Lethorodi's force numbered 600. It was routed and pursued several miles. A number of his men and many cattle were captured, the Colonials only losing one man wounded. The Basutos refuse all terms, and war is inevitable.

A large crowd witnessed Sir Bartle Freres embarkation, and there was a general demonstration of regret.

EUROPEAN.

BERLIN, Sept. 16.

The government perseveres in its intention of proposing a subsidy of several million marks for a line of steamers to Australia and the South Seas.

LONDON, Sept. 16.

The steamer Lascelles, from Liverpool for New York, put back with boilers leaky.

ROME, Sept. 16.

It is reported here that a combined mode of action has been agreed upon between France and England respecting the Greek frontier question.

BERLIN, Sept. 16.

Bismarck's appointment as Minister of Trade and Commerce was arranged to give him powers to bring about certain new taxes.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 16.

The late cabinet wished Turkey to yield on the Montenegrin question and the Sultan consented. Thereupon Said Pasha, by means of his great influence in the palace, frightened the Sultan into resistance to Europe. The Sultan is now surrounded by a clique who are utterly ignorant of politics. Riza Pasha has resigned, having refused to play the double game.

Noti.—The above despatch, when first sent, was stopped by censorship.

RAGUSA, Sept. 18.

The Albanians continue resolutely to oppose the cession of Dulcigno, and are hastening thither en masse. It is asserted they have resolved to kill Riza Pasha, who is now at Katerkal with only 1,500 men. The Albanians have forwarded a fresh threatening address to the Porte.

VIENNA, Sept. 16.

It is reported that Russia has sent a subsidy to Cettinge to aid in defraying the expenses of the Montenegrin advance. The Powers, before beginning action on the Montenegrin question, signed a protocol pledging themselves not to act for the furtherance of their individual interests.

UNITED STATES.

NASHVILLE, Sept. 16.

Two hundred marked men met at Guthrie, Ky., last night, and discussed whether they should visit Springfield and lynch the remaining negroes connected with the Lapsade murder, but afterwards dispersed. The six prisoners were brought here by the Sheriff of Robertson County and placed in jail for safe keeping, by order of Governor Marks.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Sept. 16.

A vessel just in reports as abandoned the British schooner Maggie Blanche, being towed here by the schooner Wm. E. Terry. The Blanche was lying on one side and towing with difficulty.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.

At headquarters of Republican National Committee in this city the election of Davis over Plasted, is claimed upon the basis of a despatch from Maine, which states that Davis' majority will reach 1,450.

Latest returns indicate that election will go to Legislature, as neither had a majority.

BOSTON, Sept. 16.

The town is full of strangers. Celebration to-morrow will exceed any event of similar character in the history of the city. A quarter million of strangers are in town.

THE S. M. COURT.—John McKinnon of Boston was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon on complaint of Mr. H. A. Harvie. McKinnon, it appears entered Mr. Harvie's bookstore, and purchased a few pens. He was considerably the worse of liquor at the time. On leaving the store he lifted two magazines off the counter, and as he passed out the door, the clerk snatched them out of his hands. McKinnon kicked the clerk and as he passed over the counter, fired a large dictionary at him. It struck a show case breaking the glass and doing other damage. McKinnon then got violent and broke the glass remaining in the showcase with his fist. He was fined \$6 or one month's imprisonment, and ordered to pay \$9 damages. Christy McAulay appeared for using abusive language towards Mrs. Purcell. Besides this charge, it was clearly proven that Christy kept a disorderly house. She was sentenced to six weeks' imprisonment with hard labor, and warned that on the next offense she would be sentenced to six months' imprisonment. Margaret McKinnon, a woman of fifty, appeared on a charge of drunkenness. A young man at a late hour last night, informed the police that a woman was sleeping in a yard in the vicinity of the jail. On going thither, he found the prisoner on the Jail Square, staggering and exhibiting every sign of drunkenness. When he approached her she said she was going to Mrs. M—'s for a piece of bread. In court this morning when the officer said she staggered very much, she replied that she had bad feet and staggered if she never smelled liquor. She begged the Magistrate to dismiss her and she would immediately leave the city. The Magistrate replied that he was tired of such pleas, and as he sentenced her to one month's imprisonment, she, with a pleasant smile, said she would forgive him.
