GRAND ENCAMPMENT MEETING AT SUMMERSIDE.

(Special to THE EXAMINER by telephone.) SUMMERSIDE, Aug. 10.

The Grand Lodge reassembled this morning at 10.30 o'clock. The Grand Encampment paid an official visit, and were warmly received. A number of visitors from the United States were in attendance.

At 2.30 the members of Prince Edward Lodge accompanied the Grand Lodge to McMillan's lawn, where an address of welcome was delivered by Mayor Hunt, and responded to by Grand Patriarch Samuel Watts.

The merriment excursion in the steamship Northumberland to-night promises to be a grand affair.

The election of officers takes place to-morrow immediately upon opening. There promises to be a lively contest in the office of Grand Representative, and as both Nova Scotia and P. E. Island have now in Brothers Weatherspoon and Bremner, their representatives, it is conceded that New Brunswick is entitled to the vacant office.

The people of Summerside are doing all in their power to make the visit of the Grand Lodge pleasurable.

World's Fair Notes.

The Fine Arts building at the World's Fair will have a mosaic floor, the contract for which has been let at \$16,989.

Ontario, Canada, breeders of thoroughbred animals have already applied for space for 163 horses, 193 cattle, 278 sheep, and 91 swine.

The German exhibit at the World's Fair will contain an architectural display including drawings illustrating 200 or more of the most notable buildings in the empire.

A "model of the figure of Lot's wife in salt" will appear in the Kansas World's Fair exhibit to represent or illustrate the salt industry of the state.

The South Kensington Museum, London, recently paid £20 (\$400) a year for some lace manufactured in the south of Ireland. It is said that this is the highest price on record and that the lace is of the most exquisite workmanship. The lace will be exhibited at the World's Fair.

News Notes.

The total assessable property in London, Ontario, according to the latest assessment returns, is \$14,888,822.

A London despatch says that the famous Athlone library was bought for £250,000 by the millionaire Mrs. Rylands and presented to the city of Manchester.

The evidence taken before the Prohibition Commission at Yarmouth, N. S., shows that the town is almost free from liquor selling and drinking.

Fruit jars, porcelain tops, glass water sets, porcelain and glass lamps, will be sold cheap at W. P. Colville's.

SCOTTISH GATHERING.

Large Crowd—Fine Weather

ALL anxiety as to the weather which would prevail to-day on the occasion of the Scottish Gathering and Pioneer Celebration was set at rest this morning when the clouds rolled by and the promise of a fine day was assured. The Scottish Gathering, which is one of the greatest events of each year, is this time rendered much more attractive and interesting than usual by reason of the Pioneer Exhibit. This consists of a Pioneer Log Hut, similar in detail to the kind built by the hardy Scotchmen who first settled in P. E. Island.

In this hut are exhibited a great many relics and mementoes of the Pioneers, as well as a number of valuable and interesting articles, to many of which are attached curious bits of history. The list of the exhibits is too large to be published here, but among some of the most interesting we may mention a miniature portrait of Bonnie Prince Charlie, and a garter worn by him at the battle of Preston Pans, a piece of the phibber worn by Major Alexander McDonald, General, at the battle of Culloden, a sword, a dagger and a blunderbuss which were used in battle by Capt. John McDonald, of Her Majesty's army during the American War of Independence.

At ten o'clock, a. m., the members of the Caledonian Society met at their room on Queen Street and preceded by their pipers and the Artillery Band, marched to the Driving Park, where the sports of the day were to take place.

During the day people were continually arriving on the grounds, and by the afternoon a large crowd had assembled. Variety was added to the scene by the uniforms of the sailors and marines from the warships. The different events on the programme of sports were well contested and watched with interest by the spectators. In the light hammer throwing competition, Meikle, a Nova Scotian, made an exhibition throw, and succeeded in making the hammer cover a distance of 102 feet.

A most entertaining feature of the programme was the exhibition of Indian club swinging by Mr. McBeath, of Scotland. He won great applause for his expertness in handling the clubs.

One of the most exciting events will be tug-of-war. The teams of sailors from the men-of-war are to compete, and the struggle for victory will be watched with intense interest.

A venerable dignitary of the Church of England has passed away by the death of Bishop Cloughton, who died near Chelmsford last week at the age of 84. Mr. Cloughton labored long and successfully in the industrial centre of Kidderminster, where his untiring energy, organizing ability and great enthusiasm for religious work accomplished great things and secured for him a great reputation.

Paterson, that he had just inspected Onslow Ford's model of the statue of Sir John Macdonald, which it is proposed to erect at Toronto, and was accompanied by Lord Lorne, who expressed the highest approval of the work. Lord Lorne has taken the warmest interest in Mr. Ford's efforts to obtain a satisfactory likeness, and Sir Casimir will bring over the model with him on the Parisian, sailing 15th inst.
