Empire Press May Meet In India

LONDON, July 17—(Reuters)—The next Empire Press Union conference may be held in India, Pakistan and Ceylon, C. R. Srinivasan, chairman of the all-India newspaper editors' conference, said in London Saturday.

He said the idea being canvassed in responsible circles was to meet for two weeks in India, with a week each in Ceylon and Pakistan. Srinivasan, on his way home from this year's Imperial Press Conference in Canada, said Canada "is the problem country of the century."

"With its limited manpower it has developed so fast that its internal economy cannot sustain it. . . an economy standing on its apex and not on its base is beginning to worry (knowledgeable Canadians)."

"There is an uneasy feeling that (Canada's) junior partnership in dollar economy may cost them dear should a recession set in."

Woman Becomes Honorary Member Of Engineers

(By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, July 17 — A woman with 12 children and almost as many college degrees, Dr. Lillian M. Gilbreth of Montclair, N.J., today became the first woman honorary member of the Canadian Institute of Engineers. She received the award at the Institute's annual meeting. Mrs. Gilbreth is "mother" of the best-seller, "Cheaper By The Dozen," written by two of her children. She is a consulting management engineer and president of her late husband's engineering firm in Montclair. She has nine degrees, six honorary. Mrs. Gilbreth said today there's only one finer profession than engineering—motherhood. "The woman in the home has the best field for research in the world," she said. "Psychologists, manufacturers and child-study experts all want to know what is happening to the home and family."

U.S. May Need More Aircraft Production

WASHINGTON, July 17—(AP)—The United States' level of aircraft production appears to be much less than needed to support the war in Korea. Using experience gained in the second world war as a rule of thumb, losses run' about 25 per cent a month. An estimated 600 U. S. air force planes are available to Gen. Douglas MacArthur. The carrier Valley Forge with perhaps 90 planes has been in action and at least one other large carrier and one or two small carriers with between 120 and 150 planes among them, are expected to be ordered into action soon. Assuming a total of 900 planes by making allowance for Marine fighter squadrons and the possibility that another carrier will be sent to Korean waters, the monthly loss would average 225 planes by standards based on experience. This is a little less than the average monthly production of military aircraft in the United States. The deficiency is currently being met by withdrawals from storage and from air National Guard and air reserve units. Before the Korean affair began the air force had 2,600 combat planes in active units located other than the Far East and some 4,600 combat planes in storage. The navy had about 2,900 combat planes in active units and 3,900 others in storage. A prolonged fight in Korea might quickly exhaust the types most suitable for operations there. Production of new aircraft is certain to be increased under orders to be placed shortly. But new plane production ordered is not now likely to provide replacements for planes for at least a year. By comparison with recent war plane production, the United States produced 2,461 airplanes in December 1944, and it reached its wartime peak of 9,113 planes in March, 1944.
