Fewer Imports, Exports Handled By Island Ferries

There were fewer carloads of freight ferried to or from Prince Edward Island during the month of May this year compared to the same period last year. The Canadian National Railway reports 1,448 carloads of freight were ferried from Borden to Tormentine last month as compared 1,742 during May of last year.

Total imports dropped from 2,171 cars last May to 2,052 in 1959. Slight increases were noted in the exports of eggs, turnips, railway materials, moss and scrap iron. The imports showed increases in empty bags, empty barrels, lime, livestock, machinery, flour and feed, gas and oil.

ated waters, railways material, roofing and canned goods. The most noteworthy quantity import was line with 486 cars last month compared to 395 last May. Turnips lead the field in exports with 49 carloads leaving the province this May compared to 17 carloads during the same period last year.

Wives Say Minister Is Most Important

SACKVILLE, N.B.—How active should a minister's wife be in her husband's congregation? Her first job is with her husband and their home life. That's the opinion of most wives of men ordained Sunday by the United Church of Canada. Wives should do a certain amount of church work but should definitely not "run the organizations," instead they should be interested participants. By doing too much they can hamper local leadership.

It was unwise, they said, to automatically become president of societies. This does not mean that they should be idle. With their homes and families they have a wife's regular work. Also with a minister's irregular schedule it's often more important to "minister to the minister" than to the congregation.

"It is really impossible to be merely a member," one said. She referred to a complete agreement she'd made with her husband to work as he would wish any loyal member of his church to work. Many of them, already married, to their husbands while they were students have shown that.

"If it had not been for our encouragement," another said, "they would have been unable to keep on with their course". She's been married to a working man who entered the ministry. They have two children.

They referred to magazine articles which have underlined the difficulty of the minister's work. The wives said that there was probably some degree of exaggeration, but still they've already found that some people expect too much. They've been with their husbands on student mission fields. The publicity on over-worked ministers may make some people "sit up and take notice". Ministers, they thought, need congregations who will realize that a minister's job is a professional one the same as a doctor's. Therefore, his wife is not an assistant minister.

What would they say to their congregations? "We are willing to do our share. Only by giving can you receive satisfaction from life. But churches should remember that we are wives and some of us are mothers just as most of them. Unless we can care for our husbands, the church will be hampered."

"And please remember that every person is different. Never expect the new minister's wife to be just like the last one or just as you would like her to be. She has different talents and should have her own chance to use them. We are looking for-

Practical demonstrations of games were used as a method of instructing the girls in the right way and wrong way of planning programs.

On Sunday a Choral Eucharist was celebrated at 11 o'clock. Rev. Joseph Abbott delivered a most fitting sermon at this time. He emphasized the importance of leaders giving due consideration to their duties or responsibilities to the group in their charge. He said each one of us must have a definite goal in life and strive prayerfully and earnestly to reach that objective. To be a good leader one needs spiritual, mental and physical strength, he said.

The word that undergirds everything in leadership is responsibility, feeling over duty to those in our charge and being

loyal to the cause, he said. He also stated that camping can be a very maturing experience. A combination of worship, play, study, learning and living together.
