DASTARDLY BOERS BRAVE CANADIANS

Boers Offer to Surrender, Canadians Accept

TWO MEN SHOT DEAD AND THREE WOUNDED.

Bravery of Canadians Recognized and Praised.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Aug. 8.—A party of Boers near Standerton notified the English officers commanding at Waterval of their willingness to surrender.

Fifteen of Strathcona's Horse were sent to accept the submission of the officer in charge.

When the Strathconas approached the rendezvous in extended order the Boers opened fire.

A sergeant, who raised a troop in Canada, rallied his men. In doing so he rode among the Boers who demanded his surrender. "Never!" cried the sergeant, who while turning his horse was shot dead.

The Canadians lost two dead and three wounded out of a party of twenty-two.

A letter in the Daily News from its correspondent at Pretoria says: "The Canadian Mounted Riflemen with Smith-Dorrien have distinguished themselves by courageous deeds that will rank high among the most brilliant episodes of this campaign."

Referring to the Honing Spruit fight the correspondent speaks in the highest terms of praise about the courage and bravery of Lieutenant Inglis, Corporal Morden, Lance Corporal Miles and his brother, and Private Keer, of Pincher Creek, Rocky Mountains, whose men are famous for their courage and hardihood. It never boasted braver sons than those four who lay side by side behind a low bank keeping the Boers at bay. Morden was the first to fall dead with a bullet in his brain. Keer was also killed just as help arrived.

Manitoba's Short Crop.

WINNIPEG, August 7.—The Government August crop bulletin is now in the printers' hands. It will show that 348,819 acres of wheat, 143,842 acres of oats and 23,414 acres of barley have been completely destroyed by drought, etc. The remaining 1,460,396 acres of wheat will give an estimate yield of 7½ bushels per acre, or a total of 10,938,613 bushels of wheat.

BRAVE CANADIANS REPORTED

General Hutton's Glowing Despatch.

ONLY TWO OF THE CANADIAN DRAGOONS GUILTY OF SELL- ING ARMS.

Their Names are Privates Hopkins and Pears' of Toronto.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, Aug. 8.—General Hutton in a report to Lord Minto speaks in glowing terms of the conduct of the Canadian Mounted Rifles of the 2nd battalion in the engagement at Honing Spruit June 22nd. He says:—I have the honor to submit to your Excellency the names of the following officers and men for their conduct in the engagement and which I have especially brought to the notice of the commander-in-chief: Lieut. H. J. A. Davidson, Supt. N. W. Mounted Police; Lieut. W. M. Inglis, late captain Berkshire Regiment, (wounded); Corporal Fred Morden, (wounded and subsequently killed); Lance Corporal (now sergeant) Thos Miles, (wounded); Private Keer, (wounded, subsequently killed); Private Miles, (wounded.)

The news that certain members of the Royal Canadian Dragoons in South Africa disgraced themselves is unfortunately only too true, although the number is not as great as intimated in the private letter referred to in last night's despatch. Instead of 20 men it appears that 2 have each been sentenced to ten years' imprisonment for selling supplies and arms to the enemy.

The news came in the form of a report to the Department of Militia from Colonel Lessard. The men are privates Hopkins and Pears. Both were members of "A" Squadron, B. C. D., Toronto, before they enlisted.

THE SITUATION AT PEKIN

Minister Conger's De- scription.

LI HUNG CHANG'S DICTUM

Chinese Must Fight if Allies go to Pekin.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The following cablegram from Minister Conger was received last night by the State Department: "Tai Nan Yamen, Aug. 7: Still besieged. Situation more precarious. Chinese Government insisting upon our leaving Pekin, which would be certain death. Rifle firing upon us daily by Imperial troops. Have abundant courage but little ammunition or provisions. Two progressive Yamen ministers beheaded. All connected with the legation of the United States are well at present moment."

LONDON, Aug. 8.—In case the troops of the allies advance the Chinese must fight. The suggestion that the allies should be allowed to enter Pekin in order to escort the Ministers to Tien Tsin is absolutely impossible.

This is the dictum of Li Hung Chang. It was transmitted last evening to Wm. Prichard Morgan, member of Parliament, by his agent at Shanghai.

The agent had carried to Earl Li the message from Mr. Morgan urging that the allied troops be allowed to enter the capital, stating that a settlement could be made at Tien Tsin.

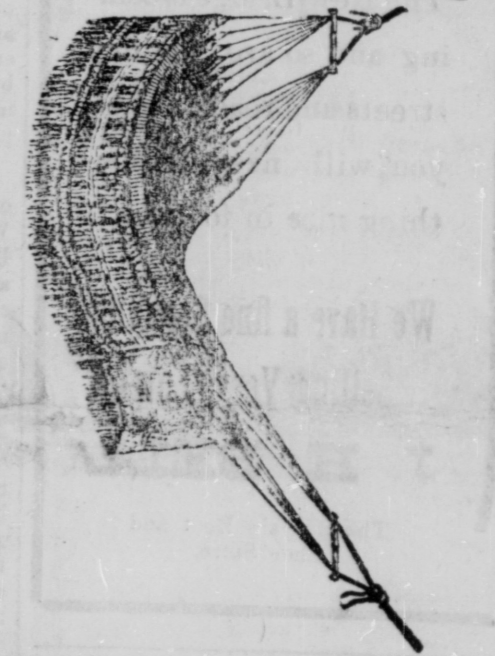
