PETROLEUM PROSPECTS.—Skillful mining engineers expect to find petroleum in Cape Breton. Similar hopes are entertained in regard to kindred discoveries in Westmorland, etc. A despatch to the Daily Telegraph, of latest date, contains the following:—"Mr. O. Baski, mining engineer of the Quebec Government, has made a favorable report upon an alleged discovery of petroleum at Point Aux Trembles, Port Neuf County. The confirmation of the alleged discovery will be awaited with interest. OSCAR WILDE arrived in London a few weeks ago, characteristically and cyclonically conveyed across the Atlantic on board of the "Bohemia." A large company was present at the wedding, which took place at the residence of the bride's father. Owing to bad weather, the guests remained at the mansion all night. On the morning of the 27th, when they had assembled at the breakfast table, it was remarked that the bride and groom were late in coming. Suddenly the shrieks of a woman were heard, and the startled guests rushed into the hall, where they met the bride of a night, who cried, "My husband! oh, my husband!" When she awoke this morning the young lady found her husband dead by her side. She is almost a maniac from grief. The funeral took place from the home in which he was married, his four groomsmen acting as pall-bearers, and the minister who married him performed the funeral services.

He is looking well, and seems to have enjoyed his recent trip to British Columbia with the Princess. A Defaulter in \$150,000. NEW YORK, Feb. 1. J. Vincent, Treasurer of the State of Kentucky, is a defaulter to the extent of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. King Cetewayo. LONDON, Feb. 1. Cetewayo has been enthusiastically received by the natives in all parts of Zululand, which he visited since his return. Yesterday he was proclaimed King by the Chiefs assembled at Ulundi. Famine in Ireland. DUBLIN, Feb. 1. Justin McCarthy, M. P., anticipates that the greatest distress will exist in the famine stricken districts of Ireland during February and March. He appeals to the Government and the wealth of the nation for assistance. Famine in Russia. LONDON, Feb. 1. A terrible famine exists in Kherson, Russia. The greatest privations are experienced by the inhabitants of the Province. A strong appeal has been made to the Russian Government for assistance. French Politics. PARIS, Feb. 1. It is feared that the sudden illness of the new Premier will have the effect of again breaking up the Ministry. Steamer Wrecked and Twenty Sailors Lost. LONDON, Feb. 1. The steamer Anconia was wrecked during a storm off Tripolie. Twenty of her sailors perished. Egypt vs. Ireland. DUBLIN, Feb. 1. Mr. O'Donnell, M. P., speaking at a meeting in London yesterday, denounced the Government for spending millions of British money in Egypt, while they declared they had none for Ireland. Latest Telegraphic Notes. Right Rev. Richard Roskell, D. D., formerly Roman Catholic Bishop of Nottingham, is dead. The heaviest floods in the British Lake district for 20 years prevails. Lakes Derwentwater and Bassenthwaite now join and a portion of Keswick is submerged. Two iron huts have been sent to Cong, County Mayo, Ireland, for the accommodation of the protectors of the informer Kerregan in the Joy case and the informer in Huddy's case. Mr. Davitt has written to an ex-tenant at Inishowra, that as the castle has boycotted him for six months in regard to public speaking he cannot fulfill his promise to speak at Inishowra pending the expiration of his sentence. On Saturday morning a family of nine negroes living on a plantation in Lesaurens County, South Carolina, killed and ate of a goose that had been bitten by a dog supposed to be mad; two hours thereafter entire family became sick and thrown into convulsions; four died on Sunday; other five not expected to live. Mace and Slade did not box at Madison Square Garden, New York on the 29th of Jan. The Garden was not opened and a cordon of police surrounded the building refusing to allow any person to approach the place. On the 30th the police commissioners referred the matter to the corporation counsel for his opinion. He returned an answer that as the sparring was for gate money it was accordingly a prize fight and a crime under the laws governing that class of misdemeanor.
